



Principal's Message

The Senior Student Leaders chose "Do more, be more!" as this year's College theme. Based on the Ignatian idea of the 'Magis' or 'the more' this theme encouraged our students to make their classrooms, school, homes, community and the world better places - as St Ignatius would say 'for the greater glory of God'.

It is not necessarily about doing great things, although Ignatius encourages us to dream big and plan boldly. Rather, it is more about doing the little things better. So in keeping with our theme, our community members have been encouraged to adopt an attitude of the 'Magis' to do the more and be the more that leads us to being more competent, conscious and compassionate, better prepared to be women and men for others.

As a school community we are on a quest for never ending improvement. This year was our review year. We reflected on how we have been going and planned for improvement.

Our theme fitted in nicely with our improvement planning as we strive to 'do more' and 'be more' as a school community.

The process Catholic schools use for school improvement planning is the 'School Improvement Framework' or 'SIF.' The SIF promotes a four-year cycle of school improvement and the School Review normally takes place in the fourth year of this cycle. The SIF process also incorporates a verification of the evidence that a school is meeting the Victorian Registration & Qualifications Authority (VRQA) minimum standards and is conducted by the external school reviewer.

Three outcomes of the SIF process were the School Improvement Plan for the next four years, the Annual Action Plan for 2013 and verification that we have been meeting the VRQA minimum standards.

I am grateful to members of the Leadership Team for their work to lead this review and in particular, our new Deputy Principal, *Mr. Paul Lewis*, who coordinated the SIF process.

The Catholic Education Office Melbourne (CEOM) also provided support to us through Principal Consultant, *Ms. Liz Gleeson*. I am grateful to the CEOM for this support.

The Parents and Friends' Association (PFA) is a very positive and important support group in our community. I recognise the generous and valuable contribution parents make to our school community through membership of this group.

Thank you to all members of this group and in particular the current office bearers: *Mrs. Joanne Ketchen* (President); *Mrs. Kristi Sabell* (Secretary); *Ms. Debbie Isbister* (Treasurer); *Mrs. Helen Benjamin* (Fundraising); *Mr. Bernie Malone* (Environment) and *Mr. Steve Gibb* (PFA College Board Rep.).

There are a variety of ways parents can help out. The College canteen helpers are vital to helping us provide a canteen service to our students. Some of the other ways the PFA supported our school community include: running fundraisers and social events, helping out at school functions, organizing working bees, encouraging and supporting a sustainable school environment, running a second-hand uniform shop and a second-hand book sale. I ask all parents to please support the PFA where you can as their work benefits all students.

I am very pleased that the next stage of the Middle School Building Program will be completed early in term one next year. This exciting building project includes the construction of: sixteen new general purpose classrooms for Years 7 and 8 students; an additional two Science Laboratories for all students; another Art room for all students; and a Visual Communication classroom for Years 9 -12 students.



The new Middle School (Year 7 and 8) building will be finished for the start of the 2013 school year.

These new facilities will be a great enhancement to the learning environment for our students. I am very grateful for staff and student 'flexibility' during the construction period.

With the goal of achieving expanded new facilities in sight, everyone worked together to make the best of the temporary circumstances.

There have been a number of significant developments in the ICT area to improve communication this year.

We launched a new website and a smartphone and tablet 'App,' we changed from weekly paper newsletters to fortnightly electronic editions, we have upgraded our internet bandwidth to accommodate larger incoming and outgoing 'traffic' and all students and staff have access to a laptop computer.

Since the end of last year, there have been three international student trips. Beginning mid-November last year, three teachers, *Mr Byron Mitchell*, *Ms Kerry Sidaway*, *Ms Julia Hall* and twenty-eight Year 10 and 11 students spent a month in Tanzania, Africa. Our school group travelled under the guidance of World Challenge Expeditions who provided a guide for each of the two groups.

They flew into and out of Dar es Salaam. The trip included a trek up Mt. Meru (a dormant volcano about 60 km west of Mt. Kilimanjaro) and service project at a primary school (985 students who share 5 run-down classrooms) in the town of Moshi in the shadow of Mt. Kilimanjaro. The group returned with many stories about their wonderful adventure including their sighting of majestic African wildlife while on safari.

In late June this year, two of our Year 11 students, *Chelsey Excell* and *Patrick Malone*, together with *Ms. Kerry Sidaway* (Deputy Principal) travelled to Dili, East Timor with a group of Year 11 students and teachers from Jesuit and Jesuit Partner Schools from across Australia. This 'immersion' experience for the students involved them visiting the Jesuit school and touring some of the surrounding areas.

The Malaysian Study Tour held in the last week of term three and the first week of the holidays was again a great success. Eighteen Year 10 and 11 students studying Indonesian and teachers, *Ms. Julia Hall, Mrs. Norma Ellis* and *Mr. Christian Berti* travelled to Kuching in northern Borneo for this exciting adventure. Unfortunately these students of Indonesian language could not have their "immersion" experience in Indonesia however, the opportunity to spend time in another country where the culture is similar and the same language is used as in Indonesia was a very satisfactory and an enriching alternative.

Tuesday 31st July is a special day for our college community - the day we celebrate the Feast of St Ignatius of Loyola, the college's patron saint. As in previous years, the feast day celebrations received overall very positive feedback.

We are hoping that this day will continue to be a special one in the culture of the college over the years and indeed a day the students and staff look forward to and celebrate – a very positive community building event.

July was a special month for *Fr. Des Panton* (President of the Canonical Administrators). He celebrated his 75th birthday, his Golden Jubilee as a Priest, 50 years since his ordination on 21st July 1962 and he retired on our feast day.

As a school community we celebrated these milestones with Fr. Des as part of Feast Day and thanked him for his tremendous support of our college during his years as President.

Fr. Des Paton bids the school a fond farwell on his retirement which coincided with the College's Feast Day. During the term two holidays the Australian Jesuit Province held an Inaugural Education Conference for Jesuit & Jesuit Partner Schools from across Australia. I am very pleased to report that thirteen Saint Ignatius College Geelong teachers and I were able to attend.

This three-day professional learning activity was held at five different locations, each with a different focus, as follows:

- Sustainability/Environment/Ecology John XXIII College, Perth
- Retreats and Reflection Days /Service and Immersions/ RE Curriculum - focus on student formation - Saint Aloysius' College, Milson's Point
- Formation for Mission and Identity forming people to form students - staff and parents - Saint Ignatius' College, Adelaide
- National Curriculum in an Ignatian School Saint Ignatius' College, Riverview
- Co-curricular Experiences Xavier College, Melbourne

I am grateful to our staff for taking time during the holidays to attend. I thank the host schools and organizing committee, coordinated by *Ms. Jenny Hickey* (Province Social Ministry Delegate) and *Fr. Chris Gleeson SJ* (Province Education Ministry Delegate), for their work and hospitality.

The theme for the conference was 'A fire that enkindles other fires' and the overall objective was "to establish Professional Learning Communities who will work initially, on a particular goal, create personal contact and establish ongoing support and communication across all Jesuit and partner schools."

As a community we experienced deep sadness and grief during the year with the sudden and tragic death of a fine young man, Year 8 student *David Markov*. David has been very sadly missed and I ask you to please keep David's family and friends in your thoughts and prayers.

I commend our community on the support we have provided to the David's family and each other during this sad and difficult time earlier in the year.

Although the Curriculum has always been high on my agenda, the continual growth of our College meant that my time needed to be split between Curriculum and assisting the Heads of School and the Student Wellbeing coordinator in the area of Student Wellbeing.

This change has allowed me the opportunity to work closely with *Mrs. Narelle Spencer* (Head of Middle School) and *Ms. Rebekah Spencer* (Head of Year 9) in supporting them to ensure positive outcomes in student wellbeing. It has been great to see how Mrs. Spencer has overseen the development of our temporary Middle School area to be an area where the students still feel an affinity with their part of the College. As always Ms. Spencer has provided wonderful opportunities for the students in Year 9 to have experiences in both the natural world - the Surf Coast walk and the human world - the Melbourne Experience.

It was great to welcome *Ms. Sarah Armour* to the College when our Student Wellbeing Coordinator *Mrs. Katie Self*, embarked on maternity leave. Ms. Armour has been proactive in getting to know the students and organizing activities for those in the 7-9 year levels as well as supporting those who require her experience in support and referral.

Mrs. Annette Chidzey, Head of Teaching & Learning, has worked tirelessly over the year to ensure that all areas of our curriculum are documented and this information is communicated to all members of our learning community.

Mrs. Chidzey and myself also work closely with *Mr. Andrew Smith*, VCE Coordinator and *Mr. Byron Mitchell*, eLearning Coordinator to ensure the smooth delivery of our curriculum. A strong focus for this year has been towards the introduction of the Australian (National) Curriculum.

Next year students will study National curriculum in the areas of English, Mathematics, History and Science as well as be assessed against these standards. If you want more information about this curriculum, I encourage you to visit www.australiancurriculum.edu.au to learn about the changes.

Each year the College hosts a number of Pre-Service (student) teachers from a range of tertiary institutions such as Australian Catholic University and Deakin University. They work closely with one or two of our staff, learning the skills of teaching and gaining experience in working with students. I thank the staff who have taken on the mentoring of these students as they often report that they enjoy their enthusiasm and feel renewed by their presence. Over the years we have been fortunate in employing some of these outstanding young people as teachers in our College. Two notable additions over the last two years have been *Ms. Sarah Callahan* and *Ms. Sarah Pitaro*.

This year has seen almost all staff now take part in the Performance and Development Program to afford them the opportunity to review and develop their teaching practices.

This has occurred under the guidance and support of *Mrs. Fran Kealey*. Thanks must also go to our Domain Leaders and Mrs. Chidzey who worked with staff to ensure the development of improved curriculum programs for students.

This year saw a major change in our structure which will better enable us to meet the demands of our successful and rapidly growing college. My role has been refined and my focus is now Curriculum and Pastoral Care for Years 7-9.

It was my pleasure this year to lead the Australian Jesuit Province Immersion to Timor Leste (East Timor). In July I travelled with staff from Loyola College, Watsonia and Xavier Catholic College, Hervey Bay and 16 students from the network of Jesuit schools across Australia. It proved to be a very busy experience from the organizational viewpoint, but so rewarding when I received the feedback from the staff, parents and the students about how wonderful and enriching they found the experience to be. I enjoyed working with the Jesuit community in Railaco and in Dili, where they are building a new school that will open its doors in 2013.

It will be the focus of our fundraising activities for the next Immersion to support the growth and development of this new school.

"ACE 2012" - Amaze, Create and Engage" an ICT-focused staff professional learning activity was held again this year.

It was held over two days in August however, this time all four Catholic schools in Geelong joined us. I would like to acknowledge *Mr. Byron Mitchell* who worked with leaders from the other schools to develop this professional learning activity. Many of our staff presented workshops to their colleagues in the other schools and our ICT support staff kept everything running very smoothly. This conference continued the support of the Technology Enhanced Learning (TEL) Program, the 1:1 laptop program.

Our *Parents & Friends' Association* has gone from strength to strength over the last five years where they are able to support many different activities across the College. They are able to support their drive for a sustainable college through the VCAL Edible Garden program and their organisation of the Annual College Working Bee. The uniform shop now has a permanent home in the new administration wing and thanks to our generous volunteers, opens on a regular basis each Monday afternoon. They again supported students to take part in the Jesuit Immersion to Timor Leste and sponsored the purchase of 2 data projectors for the new College in Dili.

I look forward to meeting the continual challenges and the excitement that is part of Saint Ignatius College and wish a happy and safe Christmas to everyone.

As a Catholic School operating in the Jesuit tradition Religious Education is an integral part of life at Saint Ignatius College. All students from Year 7 to Year 12 undertake studies in some form of Religious Education.

The overriding goals of all our courses is to lead the students into a deepened relationship with God, right relationships with others, a greater understanding of the Church, and empowerment to work to create a just world.

The great challenge our professional and competent Religious Education team face is how to engage young people in making sense of and interpreting the messages they receive from our increasing secular and pluralist society in light of the teachings of Christ. Mention must also be given to students *Ash Costa*, *Joel Nadolski* and *Elizabeth Scharf* whose short film on mental health awareness issues won a place at the Kempe Read the Play Competition.

Thanks to *Mr Simon Macaulay* and the VCAL team who took on the challenge of developing this course.

Finally I would like to thank all the Religious Education teachers at Saint Ignatius College for their wonderful support and commitment to our program. It has been a great year and I look forward to together meeting the challenges of 2013.







There was no need for the time all week in terms of hours and minutes, as all activities were dictated by the sun.

The first afternoon was spent doing jobs and activities around the homestead, which included getting our packs ready for the hike, making bread and munchies for the hike and working in the vegetable garden. The evening involved eating homemade nachos in front of the open fire before retiring to bed to get a good night's sleep before the hike.

Tuesday morning the group were up early, and hiked out from the Wollangarra homestead. The two groups went separate ways but both spent an amazing 3 days hiking up to the very challenging Mountain ranges that are part of the Alpine National Park. The views from the top were breathtaking and well worth the hours hiking up the very steep 4WD tracks.

The students were amazing at working together and motivating others who may have been struggling. They were faced with some big personal challenges but have learnt from this experience as long as you don't give up anything is possible.

We were extremely lucky this year to once again be able to offer this wonderful program.

Wollangarra is a unique outdoor learning program that aims to build leadership skills, develop personal growth and development and learn more about the environment.

When they returned to the Wollangarra homestead, it was time to unpack and then have a hot shower before dressing up for a very lovely dinner of roast lamb and vegetables. Friday saw the group head back into Heyfield where they had lunch before boarding the bus for Traralgon. From Traralgon they caught the train to Melbourne and then headed from Melbourne back to Geelong where they were greeted by family ready to take them home for a big rest!

Thanks also to *Mr Christian Berti* and *Mrs Snookes* for giving up their time to attend the camp, you were both fantastic and the students really appreciated your time, efforts and company.

At some stage or another this year a Saint Ignatius student wearing the uniform with pride competed in sixteen sports: swimming, surf lifesaving, cross country, athletics, football, soccer, netball, tennis, volleyball, cricket, equestrian, basketball, hockey, chess, BMX cycling and water polo.

There was an increase in the number of students who qualified for regional and state representation via School Sport Victoria and there was even a meeting to start up rowing that was held at the end of Term 3.

On the facilities side of things, we are waiting for our two-lane rubberized athletics track to be completed and hopefully our Cricket practice facility will be up and running for the 2013 summer season. We are also waiting on a quote for a 2m X 25m long jump run up and pit which will be ready by July next year.

Our programs will take a huge step in 2013 with the introduction of a Year 7 & 8 sport coaching academy for students who make our GISSA sport teams.



Work and Further Education

Many have applied for University and TAFE courses; others have secured an apprenticeship or traineeship whilst others are deferring to take a gap year in order to travel or work casual jobs to save money for their tertiary studies. Whichever option they choose I hope they all find fulfilment and continue to develop as young adults and as responsible, caring citizens. I have enjoyed the opportunity to work with this group of young people as we have set about determining their planned pathway for the years ahead.

The WAFE role within the College has allowed me to work closely with many students on a wide range of scenarios to discover their individual likes, dislikes and passion. Working with students at the Year 9, 10, 11 and 12 has been both stimulating and rewarding.

Our largest ever cohort of Year 10 students (over 170) participated in the annual compulsory work experience program. This opportunity provided students with the independence to try a workplace that interested them.

Resulting from this, many students received excellent evaluation forms back from the participating employers - a document that can be used as a future reference for either part-time or full-time work. A big thanks you to the numerous employers across the region who willingly gave of their time and resources to make this program a worthwhile experience for our young people. Some students were successful in gaining a part time job for the future. Work experience can also be done at Year 11 and 12 if students wish; however it usually coincides with the holiday breaks.

The Vocational Education and Training (VET) students in Years 11 and 12 were involved in a wide range of vocations with many of them undertaking Structured Workplace Learning (SWL). Students studied in areas of; Building and Construction, Hospitality, Music, Equine Studies, Childcare, Information Technology, Automotive, Electrical, Mechanical Engineering, Event Management, Plumbing, Fitness, Beauty Therapy and Animal Studies.

Some of these students were able to undertake a school-based apprenticeship program thereby gaining regular work-place experience providing them with increased skills development. Resulting from this SWL placement, we have seen students gain a full-time apprenticeship in their field of passion.

We have continued with our involvement in the Y-Chef competition managed by BacLinks. *Mrs. Lyndal Taylor* (VET Hospitality Teacher) and *Mr. Daniel Brehart* (Head Chef and Owner of Black Bull and Tapas) worked consistently to upskill students in their culinary, organizational and team working skills to compete in this event. Whilst we did not take out first prize, the experience was invaluable and students gained so much from the opportunity.

As I write this report I am conscious of the current Year 12 students who are about to venture from the 'safety net' of the College to a world of opportunity, challenge and excitement.

This year we had two Year 10 girls (*Lily Prowse-McKeown* and *Georgia Mullins*) gain acceptance into the Alcoa Future Leaders of Industry (AFLOI) program. The program this year provided 11 students from various secondary colleges in the region with the opportunity to learn more about a broad range of jobs in modern manufacturing, meet other young people working in manufacturing, explore education and training options and visit manufacturing sites. The Geelong Regional Vocational Education Council (GRVEC) along with ALCOA provides resources and a \$250.00 cheque to meet education expenses to each of the students.

Finally I would like to extend my best wishes to all students who are leaving the College for ongoing studies, employment or other reasons. For those intending to return in 2013 I trust the holiday period will be a safe and happy time as you reflect on this year and plan for a great 2013.



Manresa

Gerry Healy SJ and Life Now conveyed by Mr. Joe McLean.

The purpose of the workshops were to provide our students with the opportunity to; explore their own spiritual journey, to further understand the enormity of the Ignatian story, to reflect on how to make positive life choices and to discuss the great work Jesuits do in our society.

Fit to Drive

This workshop was developed to ensure students gained an awareness of the risks involved in being a young driver. Experts from the Emergency Services and the Police presented information, followed by a hands on workshop based on the presentations.

Elevated Education Workshop

This seminar was designed to improve study skills and time management, to help students as they commence the first year of the VCE and Senior School programs. A workshop during Term One highlighted the importance of study skills during Senior Schooling and beyond. A follow up and extension of the program also occurred at the end of Term Four. The aim of this program was to introduce students to and build upon effective study habits leading into Year 12. Conducted by the Anxiety Recovery Centre of Victoria, students discussed the following key topics:

- Learning strategies to reduce and manage stress and anxiety whilst studying.
- How to recognise when things are getting too much.
- How to plan your study time and improve problem solving.
- How to stay motivated and maintain a healthy mood.
- How to create your VCE study team.
- Where to get help.

Career Guidance Guest Speaker

Staff from the Gordon presented information to build upon the knowledge and skills to prepare the students in selecting their possible career pathways and subject choices into Year 12. Special thanks to Mr. Bruce Connor (Work and Further Education Coordinator) for his support and help in organising each guest speaker.

Reach

The workshop aimed to potentially change the lives of our students by improving self-confidence and esteem, connecting students with each other and to increase their empathy and awareness. The workshop encouraged students to challenge themselves by stepping out of their comfort zones and expressing themselves honestly and authentically.

Celebration Day

This day acknowledges the efforts and achievements of students at the end of Year 11. We shared in Paraliturgy and farwelled students who had decided to pursue studies at TAFE or to enter the world of work of apprenticeships and recognised the many great achievements by students.

Unit 3/4 Orientation Program

Students were made aware of the content, assessments and demands of the subjects they had chosen for 2013. They were able to commence their courses and receive preparatory work to complete over the holidays in readiness for an efficient start to next year.

This year would not have been as successful as it was without the support of dedicated Homeroom teachers who regularly went above and beyond normal expectations to attend to the needs of each student in their care.



Physical Education

At Saint Ignatius College students enjoy a safe, caring learning environment that caters for individual learning styles.

Students focussed on improving their wellbeing, physical fitness, decision-making process, community activities and programs, equity and fair play during physical activities and to make informed choices for a healthier lifestyle.

This year the college also offered the opportunity for a returning Year 12 student to complete a Traineeship Certificate (III) in Sport and Recreation. *Ashley O'Dowd* who was successful in gaining the position offered a great deal of support and enhanced many of the programs offered to the students.

The school's excellent Physical Education Program continued in 2012, incorporating the Fundamental Movement Skills program for the Junior Students. The Middle School program, which caters for Year 7 and 8 Students, focused on practices that recognised building relationships, personal identity, decision making, interacting with others and leadership.

The Health Curriculum covered the following areas; Benefits of Physical Activity, Nutrition, Strategies and Tactics in improving performance, Understanding Personal Identity and Changes and Challenges. Some of the practical units included; Netball, Football Codes, Athletics, Cross - Country, Bat Tennis, Fitness Evaluation, Soccer, T-Ball, Cricket, Korfball and Basketball.

At Year 9 and 10 the students focussed on factors that influenced the development of their personal identity and values. They utilised training methods to improve their fitness level and participation in sports, games, recreational and leisure activities.

Physical Education is that integral part of the curriculum that, through human movement, concentrates on the development of individuals' maximum physical potential and their related social, emotional, and intellectual growth.

The Health curriculum covered the following concepts; Rethinking Drinking, Mental Health and Communication, Relationships, Outdoor Adventure, Australia's Health, Drug Education, Driver Education 'Keys Please' and Sport Injuries. Some of the practical units included; Aquatics, Softball, Volleyball, Fitness Evaluation, Football Codes, Badminton, Korfball, Golf, Surfing and Lawn Bowls.

The Senior Students worked hard in Physical Education Units 1 to 4 and Health and Human Development Units 1 to 4.

Participation in physical activity and opportunity for students to investigate Health and Human development across the lifespan provided opportunities for students to reflect on factors that affected performance and participation in physical activity, as well as enhancing an individual's quality of life.

The success of the year is largely due to the Health and Physical Education staff for their support, care and guidance of our students. I would also like to congratulate the students for their courage and determination shown throughout the school year. We wish them all the best for next year.

As the College enters into a new era embracing an Australian National Curriculum, the English Domain will be (along with other phases one subjects) making some exciting changes and developments to ensure that our students are provided with a plethora of interesting and valuable learning opportunities.

With the continual growth that the college is experiencing and the increase in students studying English and Literature, we strive to involve each student in a meaningful way and provide many different teaching and learning activities to enable each student the opportunity to experience success.

Early in Term 3 our Year 7 students were fortunate to be able to attend a "Meet the Author" presentation hosted by the Geelong Regional Library. Acclaimed author of teen fiction, *Garth Nix* gave an interesting and inspirational account of his professional life and writing process that had a very positive response from our Year 7 cohort.

During Years 7 - 10 the Wider Reading Wiki program (introduced in 2011) has continued and become an important fixture within the English curriculum. The original goal "to develop the reading culture amongst the students" remains, with evidence to show that students are becoming much more open and enthusiastic towards 'reading for pleasure'.

As in previous year the study of Shakespeare is an integral part of the Year 9 and 10 English programs. The Australian National Curriculum highlights the importance of understanding how language changes over time, which is examined in the study of Elizabethan vocabulary and syntax as well as Shakespeare's impact on the development of the English language. Unfortunately, in modern society, the study of Shakespeare often has a shadow cast upon it, and is unfairly categorized as "boring" or "too hard". Here at Saint Ignatius College we strive to make the study interesting and accessible for all.

Students in both Years 9 and 10 enjoy dressing up to act out the plays in classes, read aloud, view classic and modern film interpretations and experience a live professional performance (where selected students acted on stage as part of the performance troop). With the study of 'Romeo and Juliet' at Year 9 and 'Macbeth' at Year 10, the study of Shakespeare continues to break down the "boring" label it has carried for too long.

As a heartening recognition of the significance of the study of English, two English related electives were offered at Year 9 and two at Year 10 alongside the core English classes, to provide students with extra support and further challenges leading into VCE. Year 9 saw a continuation of "Lingering in Literature" and "Stepping up the Skills", and Year 10 provided "Building on the Basics" and "Beyond the Bronte's" as elective choices. Both Year 11 and 12 also retained healthy numbers of Literature students at each year level, a testament to the success of the elective options.

In our continued efforts to improve student academic outcomes, all students in Year 12 were expected to sit a practice English exam before the Term 3 holidays. To make this experience as authentic as possible, students sat under exam conditions for 3hours and 15minutes to complete 3 extended writing tasks. These practice exams were externally marked, with each student receiving expert individual feedback.

The trial exam was completed by a record number of Year 12 students striving towards exam success in late October.

2012 also saw the introduction of the year 12 LEAP program coordinated by *Fran Kealey*.

Ten Year 12 Students participated in the LEAP extension English program this year. LEAP is an initiative to assist those students who desired an ATAR Score of 40 or more in English or Literature. Students met with myself once a week after school for an hour to consolidate their skills in English in preparation for SACs and the end of year Exam.

At the beginning of this year students wrote an application to be part of the LEAP program that was endorsed by both their parents and their Year 11 English teachers. Students were chosen based on their prior academic results in English and their application to their studies. A goal was set for each lesson and students participated enthusiastically in the activities aimed at improving their written skills for a variety of purposes and audiences. All students who completed the program received a Certificate of Participation and hopefully extra confidence in tackling the requirements of the Year 12 English Exam.

Saint Ignatius College understands that literacy acquisition is critical to the long-term success of its students' Secondary education. In an era of rapid and continuous change, students at the College face a diversity of literacy challenges as they study the curriculum.

Not all subjects are dependent upon interpretation of a written text, however in each subject studied, all students strive to become literate, utilising resources, tools and technology that is offered and taught as part of their education in a classroom environment. Teachers are encouraged and receive assistance to adapt their pedagogy within the subjects they teach.

This assistance and direction is intended to help produce individuals capable of multi-tasking as they draw upon a range of literary mediums to express their personal understanding and insights.

The College has high expectations of what all students can achieve and seeks to engage them in their learning by providing tailored opportunities that are challenging, varied and stimulating.

Funding from C.E.O.M. has enabled the development of a number of initiatives. The 'Middle Years Literacy Program', undertaken by selected Year 7s this year is challenging, engaging, rewarding and also responsive to students' developmental and learning necessities. Small group flexible withdrawal sessions are structured, skills-based, intensive, systematic, motivational and relevant to students' Secondary level needs, thereby assisting in their overall literacy performance.

Likewise, the 'Teacher Literacy Professional Development Day' hosted by Saint Ignatius College earlier this year focused on refining teacher content knowledge in literacy.

Lesley Wing Jan, an Educational Consultant, facilitated a one day practical workshop to teachers from a number of Geelong Catholic Schools, on, 'Improving Students' Writing', focusing on persuasive writing, with emphasis on communal commonality traits necessary for effective teaching of writing across the curriculum and how to best support students' literacy development.

The Reading To Learn Program is another major initiative currently being undertaken at the College. Four Saint Ignatius 'Middle School' teachers have become key personnel forming a professional learning partnership with C.E.O.M.

Coordinated by *Dr Sarah Jane Culican*, this two-year interactive program's main focus is on developing teachers' professional knowledge about literacy and language as well as sustaining support for pedagogic change.

This comprehensive, interactive and multi-modal professional learning course consists of workshops, audio-visual resources, lesson plans and exemplars, supporting teachers in 'raising the profile and status of literacy and learning within their classroom teaching'.

Saint Ignatius College has a long history of involvement with our local Primary Catholic Schools in the Bellarine Peninsula.

The building and consolidation of relationships between schools benefits the students particularly when they move from Primary into Secondary school.

Shared resources, experiences, strengths/recommendations are strategies embedded into programs within the 'Middle Years supporting the development of sound literacy skills, literacy being pivotal to all learning.

Mathematics

This year saw the introduction of VCAL (Victorian Certificate of Applied Learning) Numeracy to address the needs of our applied learners in Year 11.

Under the leadership of *Ms Leesa Snookes* the VCAL Numeracy program offered challenging, project based learning. We look forward to seeing the VCAL Senior Certificate offered to Year 12 in 2013.

In 2012, the Maths domain used 'Mathletics' for online learning. 'Mathletics' combined with MacBooks means 'anytime, anywhere learning' for the students of St Ignatius College. Teachers were able to monitor student progress and student access to 'Mathletics'. It was used effectively to improve students Numeracy skills, which was reflected in our improved NAPLAN results. Online NAPLAN practice tests providing immediate feedback for both teachers and students has proved to be valuable.

The Australian Mathematics competition (AMC) was held on Thursday 2nd August 2012. Congratulations to the 140 students from SICG who were selected by their Maths teachers to be involved in the competition. The student's performance in this competition continues to improve.

The results were impressive 1 High Distinction, 14 Distinctions, 52 Credits and 47 Proficiency awards.

This competition tests everything from basic numeracy skills through to advanced problem solving.

Next year sees the introduction of the Australian Curriculum in Mathematics across Years 7 to 10. This will provide students with essential mathematical skills and knowledge in Number and Algebra, Measurement and Geometry and Statistics and Probability. It develops the numeracy capabilities that all students need in their personal, work and civic life, and provides the fundamentals on which mathematical specialties and professional applications of mathematics are built.

The Maths domain continues to focus on improving student outcomes. We have been pleased to see a greater percentage of students choosing a higher level of Maths in VCE.

This, along with improved NAPLAN results and an increase in both the number of participants and the number of awards in the AMC indicates that students at SICG are enjoying their Mathematics studies and challenging themselves to do their best. 2013 sees our priorities as continuing to improve our NAPLAN data in Year 9, offering a wider variety of assessment tasks and incorporating more ICT into learning of Mathematics. We have a range of key strategies to help us reach out 2013 goals.

2012 has been another busy year in the Science Domain, particularly as we prepare for the introduction of the National Curriculum in 2013. The emphasis has again been on providing learning opportunities and experiences for students that build links between the core concepts of the science disciplines including biology, chemistry, physics, geology and space sciences, and how these relate to the world around us.

Students have also been involved in many other activities including, competitions, excursions and special events throughout the year. Some of the highlights include the Year 7 students participating in the A Case of Conspiracy forensic science workshop where they had the opportunity to solve a murder, together with their end of year Wacky Races rubber band vehicle challenge; Year 9 students participating in a forensic science workshop at the Gene Technology Centre in Melbourne, as well as Year 9 students participating in an environmental awareness program at the Marine Discovery Centre in Queenscliff and Year 10 students competing in the Science and Engineering Challenge at Deakin University against schools throughout western Victoria.

In late May, 96 students across Years 7 to 10 competed in the Rio Tinto Big Science Competition. The Competition is open to secondary students Australia wide and across the Asia-Pacific region. It is an opportunity for students to challenge themselves and test their Science skills and knowledge.

Results were very pleasing again this year, with students from the College being awarded 10 Certificates of Distinction and 31 Certificates of Credit.

Humanities

In this College we engage our students in questions about belief systems, social organization, creative expression, historical realities and cultural norms - essentially, we will study what it means to be human. The Roman poet Terence, over 2,000 years ago, wrote: 'there is nothing relating to mankind that does not concern me.' Similarly many hundreds of years later the English poet Alexander Pope was to comment: 'the proper study of mankind is man.'

The study of Humanities does not train you for a single career path - it does much more than this. Through the study of Humanities we hope that our students will acquire the skills of critical thinking, communication and the ability to integrate information, ideas, and opinions from a variety of sources and perspectives, as well as the ability to engage in independent research. But more importantly, we endeavor to arouse curiosity and foster creativity, enabling all students to acquire a lifelong cultural awareness and a passionate love of learning and investigation from their encounters with other civilizations and the world's greatest thinkers and achievers.

This year we have been considering the Federal and State Government's new directions in relation to a National Curriculum. Initially, the focus has been on the teaching of History, which will commence from the start of 2013.

Some of the changes will include broadening the scope of teaching and learning to encompass Australia's interaction and relationships with our Asian neighbours as well as looking at Australia's involvement in global affairs. Many of the existing programmes will be retained, however we are making adjustments to where and when certain topics will be covered.

There has been a considerable amount of time and energy given to these changes and I am extremely grateful to the Humanities teaching staff for their commitment and willingness to embrace these changes. I am sure that the revised curriculum will encourage our students to consider the big questions and to think more deeply about events and issues which have, and will continue to, affect our society.

In addition to the new Historical content we shall be looking at the Geography programme from 2014, followed by Economics and Citizenship in the following years. It is, indeed, an exciting time for all concerned.

This year the College has continued to provide a challenging and innovative Humanities programme for our Year 7-10 students. In particular, the Year 8 classes were fortunate to enjoy a "Medieval" Day in which we welcomed, to the College, The Medieval Education Group who provided a wonderful day of activities relating to this period of History.

Our students were involved in Archery, Medieval Dance, the study of Crime and Punishment (which seemed to be especially popular!), Weapons and Armour and many other aspects of Medieval Life. One of the highlights of the day was the wonderful lunch of hearty broth and crusty bread that was provided by our Food Technology Department. It was a great day and I thank all those students who took the time to really involve themselves in the spirit of the day by dressing in Medieval costumes.

The term 'Humanities' comes from the Latin word humanitas, which means in essence 'human nature' or 'humanity'. So the Humanities involve the study of everything relating to humankind, its history, and its behaviour.

You may have seen some of the pictures in the local newspapers that reflected the very positive atmosphere of the day.

The teaching of Humanities is an opportunity for all involved to look at a variety of topics and to enable the students to understand how to apply this acquired knowledge in a practical manner. For example our Year 10 students undertake a term of preparing themselves for the workplace and looking at possible career opportunities following their time of study.

At the conclusion of this programme all students participate in a week of work placement in which they are able to sample a great number of job options. The reports from the many employers who support this programme would suggest that our students are, for the most part, job ready and willing to commit to a worthwhile contribution to the broader society. It is a credit to our workplace and careers coordinator that this programme runs efficiently and is well accepted by our students.

We continue to develop programmes at the VCE level and I am pleased with the number of students who are undertaking Commercial subjects as well as the study of History. As the College continues its expansion, these offerings are bound to increase and the offering of more humanities subjects can only be beneficial to our senior cohorts in the years ahead.

All in all it has been a growth year for the study of Humanities and I am, indeed, indebted to my colleagues in the faculty for their support and guidance in developing this very important area of study.

I commend the Humanities to all students and look forward to the continued development of, what one of my former Headmasters referred to as, "...the study of thinking.."

Technology

Students as early as year seven and eight, get to use tools, machines and equipment within the metals, plastics, wood and textiles areas. The focus is not only on producing but also to develop their creativity and designing skills.

Again many students from years nine through to twelve have selected from the many subjects offered within the technology domain. This has included areas such as robotics, textiles, automotive, woodwork, and electronics and at senior level VCE Systems Engineering and VET Building and Constructions.

Students have enjoyed the opportunity to develop and improve their skills and knowledge from all of the technology subjects.

Many choose to do a variety of the subjects offered to improve their skills and knowledge, while others will do these subjects to see if they like the area as a possible future career path. From general discussion with students they really get a lot of satisfaction from using the many different tools, machines and equipment enabling them to develop worthwhile skills to either enter into apprenticeships or as just everyday life skills.

Also the delight of manufacturing or repairing a product is extremely rewarding.

E Learning

E-Learning is a relatively new term and it can often represent quite different understandings depending on the school involved.

At Saint Ignatius College our E-Learning goal is to improve student outcomes through the use of technology.

Since the Federal Government made it a goal to reduce the ratio of students to computers, educators have been grappling with, how to best use technology to improve students outcomes and not surprisingly as with many new developments in education, such insight takes time.

In 2012, the final year levels received MacBooks. This meant that for the first time we had no formal "computer labs" but conversely all students had access to a computer and the internet wherever they were located or when ever they needed or wanted it.

For some students this increased accessibility was a distraction, but for most it meant they could obtain up to date information for research, communicate more readily with others, and generate material in ways not previously possible.

Education everywhere is grappling with the myriad of challenges that rapidly evolving technology presents by breaking down barriers to traditional learning while at the same time providing students with access to material that is sometimes incorrect or inappropriate.

As a College we recognise the importance of supporting students in their learning and we strive to give them the necessary skills to be critical researchers.

We also expect them to acknowledge the work of others appropriately when using it to support their ideas.

E-Learning is much more than computer studies or understanding how computers operate.

It is about using emerging technological tools that are increasingly available to expand student understanding as well as to stimulate curiosity and a genuine sense of wonder.


For those reasons alone, we will strive to create positive and stimulating environments that harness the power of technology to underpin effective learning.

To celebrate the success of the program I want to thank the very dedicated team of flexible and competent Teachers who took on the challenge of piloting this program. The teachers who made this happen were: *Ms. Snookes*, *Ms. Allen-Emery*, *Ms. Hall* and *Mr. Macaulay*. Without their enthusiasm and commitment from the first day, this program would have struggled and the year would have been considerably less exciting, stimulating and challenging for the cohort of 21 students.

During the early stages of the program the group decided they would like to change the way VCAL was regarded. To this end a new name was embraced which reflected what the group wanted to be. The name 'Architects of Change' (AOC) was the new name given providing a focus on the fact that each student was a change agent for their own future and for the VCAL program within the College. The group designed a logo signifying this message - this logo featured on all correspondence and many other items.

All students within the AOC group were undertaking their own Vocational Education and Training (VET) program related to their interests and passion. The skills developed within their individual VET programs were utilised throughout the year through the various activities and competencies achieved. Conversely the skills developed throughout the AOC program assisted with the development of skills for their chosen VET interests.

Throughout the year Community Partnerships were formed with outside organisations like SCOPE, and Nelson Park Special School. These partnerships provided personal growth for all students as they were expected to move out of their comfort zone and look beyond their own person needs. One activity was based at Queenscliff where AOC students conducted an orientation activity with a group of disabled students.

A large number of activities were conducted throughout the year, however some closer to home were a 'Soup Day' and a 'Three Course Meal'. This required all AOC students to be involved with the planning, organization and making of soups and meals for all members of staff at the College.

Where possible, our home- grown fruits and vegetables were utilized on these occasions. A fantastic team based activity, which was well received by all recipients.

This year was the most significant year in the history of VCAL for Saint Ignatius College in that it was the first time we have run a fully integrated program that involved all areas of the curricula working together to achieve common goals and outcomes.

Food Technology

The Food Technology Department has had a very busy but rewarding year. Students from all year levels of Food Technology had an opportunity to use a design brief to create individual food products.

The Year 7 Food & Technology students concentrated on safety in the kitchen, learning basic food handling skills.

They learnt how to how to read and interpret breakfast cereal food labels and the importance of breakfast. They have made a number of dishes including: Pizza Scrolls, Pumpkin Soup, Lamb Kofta, Nachos and Coconut, Chocolate and Banana Muffins.

The Year 8 Food & Technology students have been building on their basic food handling and food safety skills. Students examined the healthy diet pyramid as part of menu planning. They have made some great dishes including Apple Crumble and Custard, Spicy Vegetable Puffs, Pancakes, Salad and Hamburgers. They completed a design brief where students had to create their own Fruit Muffin.

The Year 9 Food Technology students had a 'Mystery Box' assignment where students worked in teams of 4 to create a two-course meal. Some examples of their great creations were a variety of Stir Fries, Pavlova Roll, Chicken and Vegetable Pasties, Chocolate Mousse, Lamb Couscous, Shepherd's Pie and Chocolate Soft Centred Puddings. The students also learnt to follow a design brief to create their own unique cupcake design.

The Year 10 students could chose two Food Electives: 'Paddock to Plate' and/or 'Thinking About Food'.

The students were given the opportunity to gain some great work ready skills in the art of coffee making. Some students were able to practise these skills at school catering events such as Open day and Feast day. In the 'Paddock to Plate' elective students cooked with a range of local products such as Mussels, Strawberries, Blueberries, Goats' Cheese and Olive Oil to create a variety of products including Focaccia, Spaghetti with Mussels and Fresh Herb Salsa, Caramelized Onion and Goats' Cheese Tarts, Scones with home made Strawberry Jam and Blueberry muffins. Corinne Blacket from Drysdale Cheese helped the students to make their own delicious Goats' Cheese from her goats' milk.

Year 10 students completing the 'Thinking About Food' elective have experienced a wide variety dishes that have consolidated and provided new skills in the preparation of food. Food safety and hygiene, food orders, writing management plans and evaluating their work have also been a focus especially with the production of foods as gifts.

Students completed a 'Chocolate Food Lovers Gift' to show their appreciation for someone who is special to them.

The Year 11 students followed a design brief and planned a two course meal around seasonal fruit and vegetables.

They also designed and created their own cake variation based on a buttercake. They finished the course designing and producing a Gingerbread House for Christmas.

Along with the many facets of teaching the Food Technology department has also been responsible for the many catering events within the school. I would like to thank the wonderful, dedicated Food Technology teachers *Mrs Mary-Anne Hawkins* and *Mrs Angela Humphrey* for their assistance.

The department could not operate without the organisation and hard work of our kitchen assistant *Mrs Carmen Polwarth* who is responsible for ordering food supplies, keeping and maintaining the kitchens and her continuous assistance with the numerous catering events.

VET Hospitality

The VET Hospitality course has a strong focus on the practical aspects of the Hospitality industry in areas such as methods of cookery, workplace health and safety, hygiene and security practices, communication skills and many more.

Students have successfully completed basic methods of cookery making dishes such as Soup, Roast Chicken and Vegetables, Syrian Chicken, Slow Baked Meringues with Lemon Curd, Shortbread and Poached Pears just to name a few. Students further developed their skills through a variety of catering functions throughout the year including; Open Day, Parent/Teacher dinner, College Board dinners and afternoon teas. These functions not only provide students with the opportunity to develop culinary skills but employability skills in areas of time management, communication, planning, problem solving and team working skills.

Our VET Hospitality students experienced an industry-based excursion to Melbourne. They visited the South Melbourne Market (to discover different fruits, vegetables, meat and fish), and Koko Black where students explored the art of chocolate making. The students then toured Melbourne's lanes and Southbank and observed the vast array of restaurants in these areas. The RACV club was next on our list, where students enjoyed a great lunch before exploring all areas of this fantastic facility, including the different kitchens and back of house areas while learning the importance of excellent customer service. Earlier in the year the VET Hospitality students explored the Gordon TAFE and enjoyed lunch at Café on Track.

Saint Ignatius College VET Hospitality Students participated in the annual Y-Chef cook-off again this year. This cook off is a competition amongst Hospitality training centres within Geelong. Head Chef and Owner of the Black Bull and Tapas, *Mr Daniel Brehaut* worked with the VET Hospitality students for a number of weeks in preparation for the Y Chef competition. All students showed a great deal of talent and dedication in producing a variety of dishes including Ricotta and Parmesan Gnocchi, Twice Cooked Chicken Breast with Sweet Corn Polenta, Apple Tart Tatin with Chantilly Cream.

In 2012, the 'Education Review' (www.education review.com.au) published research from Murdoch University that indicates Australians with a second language are at an advantage in the job market, as many employers value bilingualism.

Ironically employees were not typically expected to use their second language in the workplace, rather, employers see a second language as a sign of cultural competencies and an ability to think outside the box.

In 2012, LOTE at Saint Ignatius College has continued to expand, welcoming two hundred new Year 7 Indonesian and Italian language learners. Year 8 students enjoyed a visit to Melbourne Zoo, consolidating their studies of 'Animals and their Environments' with a fun day out, while Indonesian learners were also able to read the many signs in Indonesian in and around the Trail of the Elephants.

With help from Year 11 student *Ash Costa*, *Kloe Walton* and *Tiaha Holdsworth* from 8 Chardin have been working incredibly hard raising money for 'The Orangutan Project'.

The motivated pair spoke out about their interest in saving orangutans from extinction and managed to raise \$275.00 for the cause. The girls organised all Year 8 Indonesian classes to adopt an orangutan, supporting the not-for-profit organisation in their work with orangutan conservation, rainforest protection, local community partnerships and the rehabilitation and reintroduction of displaced orangutans back to the wild.

Year 9 Indonesian students also enjoyed a visit to Melbourne Zoo, as part of their studies of the environment and conservation issues in Indonesia. They participated in the zoo's 'Endangered Challenge' class, where they learned about the uses of the rainforest and the dangers threatening its inhabitants. Back at school, students continued their research and also created 'advertising' material that will help raise awareness of the importance of the rainforest and its inhabitants.

This topic, as well as the 'Di Pasar' ('At the Market') unit stood them in good stead when several of them joined 2012's Borneo study tour in September.

2012 has been a year of transition for the art domain here at the college. We signed out of the E12 art room with a collaborative aerosol piece.

The senior art students and some street kid (Paul James - IT), inspired by the street art of Banksy and Adrian Doyle, made a colourful farewell to Senior Art teacher *Christine Wood* who spent term 4 on long service leave. We have spent the last part of the year in temporary art spaces hoping to metamorphose into our beautifully designed purpose build arts precinct early in 2013.

The start of the 2012 school year was a time of great celebration for the Arts Domain when *Jake Wallace* [2011] was selected to exhibit his Unit 3 & 4 Studio Arts works in this year "Top Arts" Exhibition. The exhibition is held annually at the National Gallery of Victoria. In his two very successful VCE years at Saint Ignatius College Jake also received a scholarship to the National Gallery of Australia in Canberra in January 2011. We also celebrate the overall VCE results of *Renee Jacovides* [2011] who studied Studio Arts and Visual Communication & Design in 2011 and achieved Dux of the School.

Years 11 & 12 Studio Arts, Media & Visual Communication students, again enjoyed the Annual Excursion's to the Season of Excellence exhibitions, folio viewings and lectures at the National Gallery of Victoria and the Melbourne Museum.

However this year there was the added bonus of seeing a fellow student's work in Top Arts. It's a great motivator for our senior students who may have aspirations to become part of such a prestigious event. On the same day the VCE Visual Communication students saw Top Designs at Melbourne Museum, these students also attended the annual AG Ideas Secondary School Forum at the Melbourne Convention and Exhibition Centre.

This event gives the students the opportunity to listen to top artists and designers from Australia and overseas talk about their experiences in creative art and design industries. At this event the students are each given a hard back copy of a beautifully presented full colour catalogue featuring the work of all the designers who present at the week long industry level conference. It was a great experience for our students to hear these speakers and the highlight was author and artist Shaun Tan.

Once again our students worked in collaboration with students from Bellarine Secondary College on a project for Barwon Headspace to produce a set of posters aimed at encouraging young males to seek help. The students met every week after school for 8 weeks during Term 2 in our senior Art room and worked with graphic designer, *Leigh Walker* who is an ex student of Saint Ignatius College. The resulting sets of posters are now on display at school and in the wider community.

During Term 3, a number of the Year 10, 11 & 12 Art & Studio Art students participated in the Youth Art Exhibition at the Potato Shed and *Carly Ellis* was awarded one of the major prizes.

There was much interest and activity in the E 3 classroom during a number of lunchtimes in Term 2 when we hosted drawing battles 'Secret Walls." Accompanied by great music and lots of cheering and support, two students worked on large scale artworks within a time limit to complete their art works. The artists chose their own subject and were restricted to using only black markers or ink. The audience voted for their favourite by cheering and clapping. The loudest response was the winner. We ran two student heats and one teacher challenge that featured *Mrs. Pape* and *Ms Sinadinos* whose subject was a portrait of *Mr Exton*. The Secret Walls finale was a highlight of the annual Feast day activities in the gym and where *Kran Thatsanat*, *Errol Chopra & Max De Boo* faced their final battle.

Our Year 7 students enjoyed working on the greylead caricature/street art task and were very pleased with the results they achieved in creating their 3-D sculpture figures.

Yr 8 Art students have again produced some really effective lino print designs and learnt basic acrylic painting techniques.

The Year 9 Art class created a very powerful piece of Public Art based on stories of War and the painting now hangs in the Year 9 area. They also created a beautiful outdoor gallery in order to expose our school community to some of the artwork created by the masters and of course to create public art. Year 10 Art on Paper classes have produced some beautiful editions of lino and screen print designs and experimented with a large range of materials and surfaces. All students in the Art on Canvas classes have completed two acrylic paintings based on the imagery of Pop Art. Units 1 & 2 Studio Arts students spent first semester experimenting with a range of drawing, painting, printmaking and found object sculpture materials. In second semester they worked in the media and theme of their choice to produce three major artworks.

"Hundreds and Thousands" was the title of the Blockbuster VCE Visual Communication and Studio Art exhibition for 2012. The viewer was confronted with an explosion of colour and shape as they made their journey through investigations of contemporary street culture, Hollywood celebrities, war and oppression and the hypnotic blending tones of mental disorders. The Year 12 Art and Visual Communication students successfully displayed their work prior to the end of year Mass.

Mosaic was the next blockbuster exhibition, enlivening the foyer of Costa Hall with the work of our very talented student from Years 7 to 11. A range of student work was selected to demonstrate the excellent ideas and skill on offer here at the college. The exhibition was crowned by the entire collection of works produced by the Year 11 Studio Art class and we were very lucky to have the services of *Colin McGain*, who's meticulous attention to detail helped our Year 11's achieve such exceptional results. A final word needs to be reserved for the continually high standards set by *Malcolm Campbell* (Visual Communication and Art teacher).

This year is the National Year of Reading. We have supported this in many ways, some of which are: promoting the logo as much as possible in the ILC; putting up displays based on some of the NYR monthly themes like:

Laugh, Think, Escape, Question, Explore, Cry, Dream, Love2Read.

New additions to further meet Service, Research and Reading goals

As a result of much investigation and research, we have decided to acquire a new Library Automation System that will better meet the vision we have of the ILC for the 'library of today'. We have chosen Oliver v5 which is in place in many schools already. We look forward to working with this new system in late 2012.

We have added new online databases such as:

ReadPlus: a great way to see reviews, what to read next or what titles are similar to what you're reading now.

Source: a wonderful database covering youth literature. There are many reviews available. **Issues in the News**: looks at current issues and has an archive going back to 2001.

We have continued to develop the ILC Homepage to further support teaching and learning. This is accessible 24/7 for students and staff.

Research Guides, which are a starting point for the students' research, are constantly being added to. Our aim is to develop Research Guides for all topics studied. The resources in the Research Guides are sourced by ILC staff and this ensures that they are both reliable and relevant to students.

An area of focus this year was to look at ways to minimize plagiarism. We have worked with teachers to achieve this aim. To do this, we subscribed to EasyBib which is a bibliography generator. It assists students to create a list of resources they have used to complete their research.

This bibliography then becomes a component for their assessment. Staff and students were trained in EasyBib and we continue to provide support as required. Video tutorials were made to ensure students had assistance 24/7.

The ILC Blog has continued with a number of entries on a variety of topics. These include new fiction, new resources, new technologies, book trailers, and events such as the National Year of Reading. Access to the ILC Blog is via the ILC Homepage.

We have added new genres to the Wider Reading Wiki, which is continuing to go well and serving to encourage students to try different genres and sometimes step out of the rut of ALWAYS reading the same thing. We believe that eventually they will see that if they take the risk of going out of their comfort zone, they will discover something new!

What's been happening?

In March this year, the Xavier & Loyola Student Leader Workshops were hosted at our College. These were held in the ILC. We received many positive comments from these students about our ILC, some of which were, that it was "bright and open, had great novels, had colourful & comfy chairs in the reading area."

In May a team of students represented Saint Ignatius College at the Geelong Zonal Chess Tournament which was held at The Geelong College Preparatory School. All our students played well and achieved their best, both for their team and individually. Our team came 2nd overall. This resulted in being chosen to represent our College in the State Championship Finals!

The College engaged *Paul Power* to prepare our students for the State Finals.. The final team of 5 students was chosen based on the student performances at the Geelong Zonal Tournament earlier in the year and the Monday afternoon tournaments held in the ILC facilitated by Paul Power.

Congratulations to *Jayden Neville*, *Nicholas Vella*, *Jessica Vella*, *James Kerr-Nelson* and *Josh Spriggins* for making the final team! 
