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

Deputy Principals

I write this message on returning from Ecuador and the Galapagos Islands as a participant in the World Challenge program. It was my pleasure to be School Leader for Team 2 for thirty days over November and December. Sixty two students and five staff were accompanied by World Challenge staff as we trekked, checked out the wildlife and worked in local communities. A full report with some great photos is to be found elsewhere in the magazine.

The World Challenge program is just one of the many and varied programs that the College is able to offer the students to enhance their studies and their personal growth. Immersions, LOTE Study Tours and a variety of camps and excursions are all activities that staff offer to students. Although it is hard with the long hours and distance from our own families and often challenging activities, I can attest that the staff also find the experience a rewarding one.

This year saw the commencement of a new Student Wellbeing structure - Year Level Coordinators. I was pleased to be able to work closely with *Ms Allison Carlon* (Year 7), *Ms. Penny King* (Year 8) and *Mr. Ben Collyer* (Year 9) as they lead the students with care and compassion throughout the year.

I commend the way that they were able to provide both support as well as a range of opportunities for all students under their care. They were also a great support to the Homeroom Teachers, who are the first point of call for both students and parents.

The Catholic Education Office Melbourne provided us with the opportunity to take part in the Change²program.

They allocate skilled facilitators who work with a group of staff to investigate an aspect of learning and teaching, design solutions and develop implementation plans.

Two key developments have come out of this project - the Student Digital Portfolios, that will be introduced from 2014 and the purchase of a new student management data system.

More information will provided in 2014 as these developments are implemented.

After allocating time and resources to staff at the end of 2012, 2013 saw the implementation of National Curriculum in the areas of English, Mathematics, History and Science.

The staff developed new curriculum outlines to meet new standards and reviewed all assessment tasks. The changes were evident in the reports that you received at the end of the year. Over the next two years other subjects will come online and staff will develop new curriculum as this occurs.

I would like to acknowledge *Mrs. Annette Chidzey*, Head of Teaching & Learning, who has lead the Learning Area Leaders who have worked diligently to ensure our curriculum is meeting new guidelines and the students' needs.

In 2013 we developed a new Learning and Teaching Policy to ensure that we have a clear shared vision and guideline for our continual improvement.

The Policy is part of the "Learning and Teaching Framework" which brings together the Policy, our Ignatian traditions and the Performance and Development Program (PDP).

Educational research has indicated that the most effective school factor in student learning is the quality of the teaching they receive. The Performance and Development Program is a process that staff use to access feedback about their teaching practice to ensure continual improvement.

Staff review their practice in light of the 'Effective Teaching and Learning Practices' that are displayed in each classroom.

Over the course of the year staff took part in a wide range of professional learning activities to enhance their teaching.

These ranged from conferences - local, metropolitan and interstate, held both at the College and off-site as well as attending meetings with staff at other schools. To keep a record of all these activities the College purchased a program, "StaffPd", which was developed by a company based in Geelong.

This year the College again hosted a number of Pre-Service (student) teachers from a range of tertiary institutions.

They work closely with of our staff, learning the skills of teaching and gaining experience in working with students.

I thank the staff who take on the mentoring of these students. They often report that it is a professionally rewarding experience for themselves as they share and reflect on their own teaching practice.

Our *Parents & Friends' Association* has again proved to be a wonderful body in supporting the school, providing resources for staff and enriching the life of the students. Through their fundraising efforts they are able to support many different activities across the College. The uniform shop is able to open each Monday afternoon due to our generous volunteers, and it provides a much needed service in assisting families with the cost of fitting out our students.

I look forward to meeting the continual challenges and the excitement that is part of Saint Ignatius College.



What a year in L.O.T.E Italian and Indonesian in 2013! Excursions to Lygon Street, Carlton, The Indonesian Consulate in Melbourne, The Royal Melbourne Zoo visits including the Indonesian Endangered Animal Trail, Indonesian and Italian restaurant food tasting experiences in Geelong and Melbourne, the visit to Lindsay Fox's Ferrari collection and of course the development of reading, writing, listening and speaking skills.

Immersion Programs to Timor Leste

Saint Ignatius College Geelong offers two Immersion experiences to Timor Leste each year for students in Year 10 and Year 11:

- (i) An Immersion experience organized by the College
- (ii) The Jesuit Province Immersion experience.

Integral to a Jesuit Catholic education are immersion experiences, which challenge students to engage the realities of the world while reflecting on the values of human dignity and servant leadership.

Students travel to locations where they are exposed to issues of poverty and injustice while experiencing unique cultures and environments. They engage in direct service activities, participate in experiential learning, and make educational site visits - while living in the very communities that they are serving. The Immersion Program is grounded in five values:

- **1. Education** examining economic, historic, and sociopolitical issues that affect people and the environment globally.
- 2. Service recognizing the importance of meeting immediate needs of people and the environment through service.
- 3. Spirituality exploring the role of faith and spirituality in service and social action.
- **4. Social Justice** engaging in social justice and social action efforts with the goal of eliminating injustice for all.
- **5.** *Community* building sustainable relationships with people, communities, institutions, and the environment.

Showcase of VCAL in 2013: Deanne Allen -Emery

The Architects of Change display was a photo story of the themes and projects completed throughout the year for both Year 11 and Year 12. It showcased the amazing partnerships that have been forged between our College and the local community. It encompassed evidence of the work involved in understanding social diversity issues, in the areas of disability, indigenous issues and homelessness, while also understanding sustainability and the environment. Also included was an example of the cardboard furniture made by students from both Saint Ignatius College and Nelson Park School as part of the "Walk this way - Mixed Abilities" partnership.

Technology displays of Years 7-12 Wood, metals, Electronics/Robotics and Automotive work: Peter Martin, Ben Zanghi

The students who study technology usually select their subject as an elective where they design and manufacture a variety of items that were displayed such as robotic arms, motorised carts, storage and furniture items, bird houses, cubby houses, costumes and soft furnishings all of which are done under the direction of the dedicated teaching staff.

My homeroom did popcorn, served with either melted butter, salt or icing sugar or all of them. We made a pretty good profit."

"The LOTE excursion to the Melbourne Zoo was a very good way to learn how to say the animals' names in Indonesian. I liked how it was a field trip mixed into an Indonesian learning experience. It was an exciting day and very well planned by our teachers. At the start of the day, we were given a little booklet that we had to fill in as we walked around the Zoo.

Some of the activities were a word search and a crossword puzzle in Indonesian. This trip was my favourite field trip ever."

It was the second year in a row for the Year 7 and 8s that we had made it into the second round and I was happy to be part of the thrill."

"The swimming sports was fun as we got to dress up in our house colours and cheer on the members of our house. We got to go on the water slide and watch our house teams compete in the carnival races."

"Professor Bunsen Burner's hands-on presentation to all the Year 8s, about Science was very interesting and fun to be part of. All the science experiments, explosions and demonstrations were very interesting and sometimes scary."

"Joffa gave us a fun session through his cartoons about resilience and being true to yourself. His cartoons were awesome. He was pretty funny, too."

'The presentation about social media put on by Bamboo Productions was very enjoyable. It wasn't a lecture about the influences and dangers of social media, it was a role play about what could happen in certain situations. It got the point across very effectively."

"The highlight of my year was definitely the 'Girls Go Extreme' sessions. We have participated in different activities throughout term 4. We have learnt to overcome our fears and to push ourselves to the limit and give it all. We learnt not to give up as well as body image and that not every girl you see in magazines is perfect and Photoshop is used a lot."

"In term 4, Year Eight all participated in retreat day at the Curlewis Golf Club. Retreat day included lots of different activities, including a discussion about bullying, then a role play, team building exercises and looking at The Magis.

Every student had the chance to participate in these activities.

We also had a provided lunch where we chose between schnitzel and chips, beef burger and chips, and lasagna and chips. The food was delicious! The final activity for retreat day was a long walk along the Rail Trail. Retreat day was a great success and even after poor weather, the retreat day still happened. Every student who participated in retreat day got to wear casual clothes. Retreat day was a great day and a definite highlight of Year Eight."

As you can read, these reflections are wonderful summaries of what has happened in Year 8 this year. Many thanks to Alyce Willie, Lachlan Ford, Matthew Young, Liam Gati, Bethany Johnstone, Alexander Delaney and Harley Thomason for their valuable contributions.

The highlight for me this Year was three fold. Firstly, it was the amazing efforts and the amount of money that was generated from the Year 7 and 8 students from the very successful Market Day. We were able to donate \$4300 to the Jirrahlinga Wildlife Rescue Centre in Barwon Heads, which nearly closed down earlier this year due to lack of funds.

The founder, Tehree Gordon came to the College so we could present her with the cheque at our assembly. She was very grateful and overwhelmed at the generosity of our students.

It was a really 'feel good' assembly and we were treated by having two dingo pups and a koala brought along for us to admire. Secondly, the Year 8 retreats that were held at Curlewis Golf Club were very enjoyable and successful. All students entered into the activities with positivity and enthusiasm. Many thanks to the homeroom teachers who supported the programme, as well as Miss Tricia Giles and Mr Paul Lewis for being the main facilitators. We were very proud of our students, who were constantly praised for their excellent manners and attitude, by both the golf club staff as well as members of the public at the golf club who came into contact with our groups.

Thirdly, I have been so proud and impressed with the huge level of participation by so many of the Year 8 students in the sport programmes that have been offered to them throughout the year. The Wednesday afternoon sport programme proved very popular, as did the GISSA competition.

The Year 8 students have been very successful across many sports and have done the College proud, with both their positive attitude and their enthusiasm.

It has been a very busy and rewarding year for both staff and students. We will enjoy our final Celebration Day at Adventure Park after our final liturgy as a Year 8 group. Well done to the work of the class captains during the year. My sincere thanks to all the Year 8 students for their generosity, good humour and positive approach to life at the College both towards their studies, and the many challenges and opportunities offered to them. I wish them a rewarding time as they progress to Year 9 in 2014.

Finally I must acknowledge the tremendous support, dedication and care shown by all the homeroom teachers towards the students in their care throughout the year.

They are a particularly hard working, cohesive team and I have certainly appreciated their unfailing support of me in my role as Co-Ordinator. The students are very fortunate to have had such caring teachers.

We look forward to the new challenges of the year 2014.





Athletics

Students were in action across the athletics arena with a full array of track and field events on offer. High Jump, Long Jump and Shot Put were all very popular, as students tried to 'out-throw' and 'out leap' each other and beat their personal bests.

The 'Eventathlon' continues to be a popular activity. We added a 'House Tug-O-War' to this year's events as well as a Shot Put challenge. Early in the day, the Open Vortex throwers were threatening the recorders tent at one stage!

Football

The Saint Ignatius Football program delivers opportunities for all boys and girls from Year 7-12 to experience playing football against other independent colleges throughout the year.

2013 will go down as the year that our 1stXVIII, coached by *Joe McLean*, won the GISSA competition beating Christian College. This was the first time the College had achieved such a result in seven years. This win also meant they would progress through to the quarter final of the Victorian Country Herald Sun Shield. The team travelled to Camperdown to play against Emmanuel College Warnambool on one very cold winter afternoon in June. Bianca Sagor's two goals helped Saint Ignatius to a solid ten point win over Kardinia College during the first round of matches for the Saint Ignatius 'B' team, while midfielders Raini Matthews, Jaimee Crombie and Sophie Poole were superb. Saint Ignatius was far too good from the outset, setting up a great first up win. Coach Donna Quigley said that if her side could maintain the level it played in the opening match, it could prove a surprise packet for the remaining games.



Saint Ignatius 'A' team made it two wins on the trot, with a gripping 26-point victory against Sacred Heart 'B' team and a very good effort against rivals Christian College in game 2.

The game against Christian College had the scores almost locked at half-time, and after a topsy-turvy first 10 minutes of the second half, late goals to *Sophie Dinneen* and *Madeline Searle* sealed the deal. The Saint Ignatius team had far more of the ball and matched Christian College in the hard work areas of clearances, contested possessions and tackles.

The Saint Ignatius 'A' team was just more polished in the preliminary games, with *Molly Cross, Tiahna Andree-Jansz, Alexandra Smith, Zali Havelberg, Hannah Welsh* and *Samantha Gravener* earning a stack of possessions across the ground.

The victory against Clonard set up a Grand Final berth against the talented Sacred Heart 'A' team, which was played on a full-size ground. The Sacred Heart girls burst out of the blocks to kick the first three goals of the game, and we were never seriously challenged thereafter, leading by 15 points at half-time and eventually winning by 24 points. *Lucy Simmons* (8 tackles) and *Hannah Welsh* battled bravely for the 'Iggys'.

"We didn't get the ball in our forward line enough and when we did, it just rebounded out too quickly. They were able to get too many uncontested marks, and when it was our turn to move the ball in our forward line we didn't really use it as efficiently as we should have. However, I could not be more proud of these young girls and the efforts they put in throughout the day. I reckon we sent a clear message to the other schools that our girls are very good footballers," coach *Andrew Philp* said on Tuesday afternoon.

Saint Ignatius Year 10 - 12 'Girls' Football Team maintained its reputation as a school on the move after some impressive matches played in the annual GISSA (Geelong Independent Secondary Schools Assoc.) carnival, held this year again at Erwin Reserve Newcomb. On very dry and dusty ovals, the team performed well in every game played.

Game 1 was played against Clonard. After slipping a few points behind midway through the first half, the girls woke from their slumber and recorded a memorable first game win. They began to win the ball out of the centre and kicked four consecutive goals to regain the lead just before half-time.

From that point on the girls dominated. *Mahala Bond* was brilliant on the ball and through defence, *Bianca Prestipino's* creativity shone and *Amy Gibbs* showed her class.

Game 2 was played against the eventual winners, Sacred Heart. Sacred Heart dominated the centre clearances, leading that statistic 12-4 at half-time, and could not keep the ball in the forward line enough to score much wanted goals. As the wind picked up so did our enthusiasm in the second half.



Work and Further Education

Once again, another active year was experienced this year in my role. The opportunity to work closely with students from Years 9 through to Year 12 has certainly provided variety and challenge.

Recently I spent some time in the Year 9 classrooms where I discussed senior school programs, post-secondary course options and employment opportunities. In addition, students were provided with a 'career test' intended to assist them with potential career options in years to come. I look forward to working with this group in Year 10 when we do a more in-depth careers program in Term two.

Our intensive Year 10 careers program was well supported by the Year 10 Humanities Teachers and in particular I would like to thank Mr. Bill Miles (Year 10 Coordinator) for his support across the year in various activities.

The compulsory work experience program provided over 165 students with an ideal opportunity to trial a potential career. Many of the evaluations I received back from employers were extremely positive and it was great to read our students not only did themself proud, but were also a credit to Saint Ignatius College.

This year, four of our Year 10 students (*Nathan Low*, *Jordan Ritchie*, *Jared Nichols* and *Callum Vidler*) were recipients of the Alcoa Future Leaders of Industry (AFLOI) scholarship of \$250.00.

This career discovery program entailed opportunities in Engineering in Geelong and surrounds and is supported strongly by Alcoa and GRVEC.

These students were given the opportunity to participate in a wide range of activities outside the College grounds namely; tours to local engineering businesses (Alcoa, Air Radiators, Boundary Bend Olives, Lyondell Basell), tours to The Gordon TAFE (Engineering Dept.) and Deakin University (Technology Precinct, Robotics and Haptic Lab.), a day at Belmont High's Bio-Lab facility, workshops on Leadership, Communication and Work readiness, culminating in the award ceremony held at The Mercure in Geelong on November 14.

Students also completed additional work experience as part of this program. I strongly recommend any student interested in any facet of Engineering to look out for the AFLOI opportunity in 2014.

The Vocational Education and Training (VET) students in Year 11 and 12 were involved in a wide range of vocations with many of them undertaking Structured Workplace Learning (SWL). Students studied in areas of; Building and Construction, Hospitality, Equine Studies, Baking, Childcare, Massage, Automotive, Mechanical Engineering, Education, Plumbing, Community Activities, Beauty Therapy and Animal Studies. Some of these students were able to undertake a school-based apprenticeship program thereby gaining regular work-place experience providing them with increased skills development.

I would like to commend the current Year 12 students for their attitude towards their future and their willingness to consider potential options. I trust they all find satisfaction in their forthcoming endeavours.


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

In 2013 we had 13 Year 11 students study a Year 12 subject with *Nicholas Vella*, *Cooper Moody*, *Monique Campbell* and *Maree Dunstan* all achieving outstanding results. Nick Vella received a study score of 48 for IT Applications, which was the equal highest score for the Geelong region. A big well done to all of the Year 11s who successfully completed a Year 12 subject this year.

2013 was also a very big year for our VCAL students.

They began the year by completing a number of short courses including self defence, first aid and team building.

Their major projects for the year was to further enhance the Edible Garden Project which involves growing, marketing and selling of their produce and cooking a wonderful meal for some staff from their produce. Another project was the Nelson Park Partnership, which sees our students working in co-operation with students from Nelson Park over a number of days.

The major community project by the VCAL students was the end of year Walkathon in which students raised over \$2500 for local charities by completing a 24 hour walk in teams of 4.





























English

As educators it is our goal to provide each student with the means to continue learning and growing beyond our classrooms. We look to both the past and the future in order to develop our understanding and strategies regarding how best to facilitate learning in the younger generations. It is important to acknowledge, adapt and incorporate the plethora of new technologies available to us. We also need to hold on to the wisdom relating to educating the whole person accumulated by some of the greatest thinkers and writers of history.

2013 has been an exceptional year in the English Learning Area. With the introduction of the new AusVels curriculum, many exciting opportunities for change and innovation have presented themselves. The focus on engaging students in their learning through providing opportunities to experience and select from multiple delivery and assessment types has allowed students to become more actively involved in their learning process. This development of differentiation strategies ensures that all students have the chance to experience success while demonstrating the specific learning outcomes of each area of study.

The continued acknowledgement that education is no longer a "one size fits all" entity means that teachers at Saint Ignatius College, strive to build the skills that will make our students inquisitive life long learners. With the continual growth that the College is experiencing and the increase in the number of students studying English and Literature, we continue to innovate and expand our curriculum to best engage and educate students in critical analysis and understanding of language and literacy.

This year the Year 7 students were introduced to the fantastical writings of Lewis Carol in their study of Alice's Adventures in Wonderland. This became an exciting vehicle for a gamut of creative and imaginative writing activities. As an extension of this creative and poetic language study, all Year 7 students were fortunate to have a presentation of "Poetry to the Rescue" by acclaimed Australian Children's author Steven Herrick, where students were given insight into the inspiration and writing process of a professional writer.

Mr. Herrick demonstrated his poetic and performance skills by adlibbing several poems as part of the presentation, incorporating students and teachers from the year level and engaging them in the process of creation. The students positive response highlighted how much of an impact being involved in a variety of learning experiences can have.

As part of the celebration of Book Week this year the Year 8 English classes in conjunction with the ILC participated in writing workshops with two popular Australian authors / illustrators: *Mandy Ord* and *Scot Gardner*. Students were inspired to create story ideas and illustrations that were creative, interesting and "out of the box", while hearing about the lives and professional experiences of each of the writers.

The response from students was outstanding, with many staying back after the presentations to talk with the authors and to borrow books from the library by the presenters or request the purchase of any that were not already on the shelves. This experience inspired many students to read and write more widely than they had previously.

As in previous years the study of Shakespeare was an integral part of the Year 9 and 10 English programs.

AusVels highlights the importance of understanding how language changes over time, which is examined in the study of Elizabethan vocabulary and syntax as well as Shakespeare's impact on the development of the English language.

Unfortunately, in modern society, the study of Shakespeare often has a shadow cast upon it, and is unfairly categorized as "boring" or "too hard". In English classes we strive to make the study interesting and accessible for all. Students in both Years 9 and 10 enjoyed dressing up to act out the plays in classes, reading aloud, viewing classic and modern film interpretations and experiencing a live professional performance (where select students acted on stage as part of the performance troop). With the study of 'Romeo and Juliet' at Year 9 and 'Macbeth' at Year 10 the study of Shakespeare continues to break down the "boring" label it has carried for too long.

At Saint Ignatius College we encourage students to continue to learn beyond the classroom and core classes by providing many extra curricular activities in which they can become involved. Specific to the English Learning Area are the opportunities to represent the college in the DAV debating competitions, enter writing competitions, participate in the library "book club" and applying to be in elective English classes at Years 9, 10 and 12.

During 2013 Year 9 students were able to elect to study Advanced English as an elective, where they experienced the study of text and language in an introductory fashion to the Year 10 and VCE studies of Literature. This elective ran in both Semesters and had many students enjoying a different side to the study of English. In Year 10 two English electives were provided. "Building on the Basics", designed to assist students to consolidate their English skills before entering VCE and "Beyond the Brontes", designed to establish the skills for in-depth literary analysis.

The number of students choosing to extend their study of English beyond the core classes is a testament to the significance and value placed on the development of literacy skills and the interest that students have in pursuing literary studies. At VCE we continue to strive to improve student academic outcomes through a rigorous yet varied study of VCAA approved and recommended texts, language use and the creation of original written pieces that adhere to a chosen context. Students complete several assessment tasks, as well as exams throughout the year. As Year 12 students do not sit a mid year exam, students are expected to sit a practice exam before the Term 3 holidays in order to experience an authentic exam scenario. A record number of students sat this exam, which was formally assessed by an external exam marker, with feedback provided, to reinforce the authenticity of the exam experience.

As part of the Year 12 English study, students were once again given the opportunity to participate in the LEAP program, held after school on a Monday afternoon, led by Mrs. Kealey.

LEAP Report

Fourteen Year 12 Students participated in the LEAP extension English program this year. LEAP is an initiative to assist those students who desired to significantly improve their ATAR score in English or Literature. Students met once a week after school for an hour to consolidate their skills in English in preparation for SACs and the end of year Exam.

At the beginning of this year students wrote an application to be part of the LEAP program that was endorsed by both their parents and their Year 11 English teachers. Students were chosen based on their prior academic results in English and their application to their studies. A goal was set for each lesson and students participated enthusiastically in the activities aimed at improving their written skills for a variety of purposes and audiences.

A highlight of the program this year was the opportunity to analyse the policies of local politicians in preparation for the Federal Election. They used and improved their analytical skills in determining how well politicians responded to their questions about local and national issues. The media exposure they received was significant and Sarah Henderson made a personal visit to the College to meet with the LEAP students. Hopefully, by participating in the LEAP program this year, the students gained extra confidence in tackling the requirements of the Year 12 English Exam.

Mathematics

This year saw changes to the Mathematics courses offered at SICG with the introduction of the Australian Curriculum in Years 7-10. Year 12 students were able to undertake Senior Numeracy for the first time at our college as part of the Applied Learning program in Year 12. Mathematics help sessions at lunchtimes were offered all year to give students a chance to get some extra tuition.

Extensive planning and preparation was undertaken for the 2013 school year in order to get our new Australian Curriculum courses ready. The new course provides students with essential mathematical skills and knowledge in Number and Algebra, Measurement and Geometry and Statistics and Probability. It develops the numeracy capabilities that all students need in their personal, work and civic life, and provides the fundamentals on which mathematical specialties and professional applications of mathematics are built.

In the Middle School there has been a focus on increasing the amount of problem solving and investigation style tasks to make mathematics more relevant and interesting.

Both Years 7&8 collected and analysed real life data for their Statistics units and Year 9 students linked in their studies of Mathematics with their Surf Coast walk. To incorporate ICT into Mathematics the program 'Geogebra' was used across Years 7 and 8. This program has interactive geometry and algebra that helps students develop their skills in visual thinking.

Our students used the online mathematics program 'Mathletics' It was amazing to see almost 750 000 questions being answered. Over 500 000 questions we answered through LIVE Mathletics where students competed against other students from all around the world. The remainder was from the full curriculum section. Online NAPLAN style tests were also used through this program in preparation for the NAPLAN tests.

At VCE level our results from 2012 were most impressive.

Congratulations to *Timothy Jones-Murphy* who scored a perfect 50 for Further Mathematics. Scores of over 40 were achieved by *Philip Carapalis*, *Daniel Howard*, *Darcy Mullins*, *Seamus Cathcart*, *Hugh Fleet*, *Jackson Gravener*, *Nicholas Prideaux* and *Liam Traynor*.

The 2013 AMC was held during Term 3. Over 100 students were selected by their Maths teachers to be involved in the competition. This competition tests everything from basic numeracy skills through to advanced problem solving.

Ronan Healy (Year 7), **Kyle Wig** (Year 7), **Jessica Vella** (Year 9) and **James Kerr-Nelson** (Year 10) achieved excellence, being placed in the top 10%.

The Year 10 Environmental Science class went out and experienced the local environments of the rocky shoreline of Barwon Heads and the open grassy woodlands and wetlands at the Serendip Sanctuary near the You Yangs. The Unit 2 Biology classes went to Barwon Bluff to investigate its ecosystem and the interactions which occur within it.



Science and Engineering Challenge

A team of Year 10 students competed in the Science and Engineering Challenge held at Deakin University.

Students competed in various activities that awarded points for their ability to work cooperatively and to create solutions to engineering challenges. Humanities

Through exploration of the Humanities we learn how to think creatively and critically, to reason, and to ask questions.

Because these skills allow us to gain new insights into everything from poetry and paintings to business models and politics, humanistic subjects have been at the heart of a liberal arts education since the ancient Greeks first used to them to educate their citizens.

Research into the human experience adds to our knowledge about our world. Through the work of humanities scholars, we learn about the values of different cultures, about what goes into making a work of art, about how history is made.

Their efforts preserve the great accomplishments of the past; help us understand the world we live in, and give us tools to imagine the future.

Today, humanistic knowledge continues to provide the ideal foundation for exploring and understanding the human experience. Investigating a branch of philosophy might get you thinking about ethical questions. Learning another language might help you gain an appreciation for the similarities in different cultures. Contemplating a sculpture might make you think about how an artist's life affected her creative decisions. Reading a book from another region of the world, might help you think about the meaning of democracy.

Listening to history might help you to have a better understanding of the past, while at the same time giving you a clearer picture of what the future holds.

Tony Golsby-Smith, founder and CEO of Second Road, a business design and transformation firm headquartered in Sydney, suggests that people trained in the Humanities have learned to play with big concepts, and to apply new ways of thinking to difficult problems that can't be analyzed in conventional ways.

There are some really compelling reasons why the Humanities is essential to the development of the whole person, a concept we embrace here at Saint Ignatius College. In the words of the Mission Statement Saint Ignatius College is a Catholic Coeducational community that is learning centred and supportive, in the Ignatian tradition. The College is committed to the education of the whole person and the development of young adults of competence, conscience and compassion who will be of service in the community.

If we are to be true to our mission then it is necessary for us to present all our students with the opportunity to develop the skills, which will equip them for life beyond the boundaries of our College.

We do this through encouraging our students to look at a diverse range of civilizations and cultures, as well as understanding the environment in which we live, and the impact we have on that environment. We intend to encourage our students to become active members of the broader community and to engage with others to ensure that we leave a legacy which future generations will look back on and say, "they did a good job for us and we thank them for it".

Robert Newman, Dean of the College of Humanities at Ohio State University recently stated that, "A multi-dimensional world requires more than a one-dimensional education. The next great discoveries in our world will come not just from those with prodigious technical skills, but from those whose imaginations have been stimulated and whose ability to make connections outside the box have been fostered. Toss in some ethical sensibilities and we have the ingredients for a positive future, a veritable road to everywhere."

Our Year 7 students look at ancient civilizations and attempt to understand life in those harsh times through the study of Rome and China, using ICT as a means by which they can present their information to other students and thus create a learning environment. In addition the study of rainforests helps our students to better understand the importance of maintaining a viable habitat for all creatures and understand why species become extinct.

This year we have expanded our Humanities offerings by embracing the Australian Curriculum, especially in the area of History. We focus on our Asian-Pacific neighbours and look more closely at Australia's relationships with the region within which we live. In addition we have studied environmental issues and the impact that we have on our planet, from both a regional and global perspective.

This was clearly demonstrated when our Year 9 students 'combed' the beach during their 'Marine Debris Excursion'. It was an 'eye-opening' experience for them to find so much waste left behind on our beaches.



Our Year 8 students experienced all the wonders and hardships of Medieval Societies during their 'Medieval Day'. The students dressed in medieval costume and enjoyed a hearty luncheon kindly provided by our Food Tech. Department.

It was good to see so many students actively engaged in real-life experiential learning and enjoying it as well!

All Year 10 students worked on a job readiness programme and then spent a week out in the workforce.

This is so important in that it better prepares them for life in the workplace and beyond schooling. In addition the study of economics is encouraged through the Year 10 elective 'Money Matters' which continues to be a popular option for many of our students. Financial literacy is taught to varying degrees from Year 7 through to Year 10 and it is this understanding of how the 'money world' operates that will, hopefully, create more responsible citizens of the 21st. century.

Our numbers at the VCE level continue to grow and it is pleasing to see so many students undertaking Humanities courses at years 11 and 12. It is, fully, our intention to continue this expansion to allow for greater choice and opportunities for all students.

The Humanities Learning Area is comprised of a great number of very creative and dedicated teachers. I am, indeed, fortunate to have the opportunity to work with the team to ensure the best possible outcomes for all students.


The Domain is very fortunate to have a state of the art sanding machine donated by the Parents and Friends Association of the school and we are most grateful to them for their generosity.

The Technology Department staff, encompassing Textiles, Systems, Automotive and Wood have had a very positive year.





This year has been a huge success for our Architects of Change (AOC) (VCAL) program on several levels with an initial enrolment of 30 students. To begin, it was our inaugural Senior (Year 12) group for this College.

The group initially consisted of 12 students but as time went by, the number dropped to 10 as a result of one student obtaining a Building apprenticeship and the other deciding to study in a Fitness program at an alternative training venue.

The remaining group of students worked on developing skills to prepare themselves for the world beyond secondary school.

The Intermediate group began with 19 students. However by April the number had dropped to 17 students due to a student gaining a fulltime Apprentice Chef position and the other a Hairdressing apprenticeship.

The AOC teacher team worked tirelessly together to form an integrated, interesting and challenging program for students to achieve at the required level. At this point I would like to commend and thank the following teachers for their hard work and dedication; *Mr. John Clatworthy*, *Ms Julia Hall*, *Ms. Kirsty Allan*, *Mr. Peter Grull*, *Ms. Leesa Snookes* and *Mr. Simon MacCaulay* (till June).

A special thank you for the assiduous efforts of *Ms. Deanne Allen-Emery* in her capacity as the VCAL Coordinator (development) who developed, supported and provided guidance to teachers and students at both the intermediate and senior levels. Well done to all of you ... enjoy your well-deserved break.

This year the College leadership allocated a designated VCAL centre for the two classes, providing increased delivery flexibility and continuity. This area (consisting of two classrooms with office and storage space) was located near the edible garden project and the Technology rooms allowing students and their teachers easy access to these zones.

Students at both levels worked on numerous integrated projects throughout the year.

- Up skilling programs RSA, Barista, Safe Food Handling, Cert III Safe Driver program and Level 2 First Aid.

The Year 12 group worked on activities /projects involving themes of (i) Indigenous Australians and (ii) Homelessness.

- A fund raising night was held to support Yenbenna Training Centre which assists Aboriginal Youth.
- Echuca Camp was organised with an Indigenous theme.
- Research was undertaken on "Closing the Gap" strategy where students looked at the life expectancy in Aboriginal communities. There was a health and fitness component involving the interaction with Primary aged students
- Homelessness theme involving community engagement, social awareness and active citizenship.
- Big Issue Classroom and Urban Seed in Collins St. provided students with hands-on experience to break down stereotypes and considered issues around alcohol and drug abuse.
- Students designed and constructed dog kennels for the Geelong Animal Welfare Shelter in Moolap.
- "Give where you live" and "Urban Seed" in Norlane project. This project created playing space for young people, the building of a chicken coop, native planting and the establishing of a lawn area.
- Possum boxes were also built for the Leopold Wildlife Shelter.
- Structured workplace learning and School based Apprenticeships.

As we move to the end of this year, I would like to congratulate all the students for a great year of learning, skills development and fun. In particular I would like to congratulate those who have gained an apprenticeship, traineeship or are continuing onto further study as a direct result of the experiences and learning that has taken place during their time as AOC students.

Some of these successes will take students into apprenticeships in Building, Automotive, Bricklaying, Cooking, Hairdressing, Plumbing and further education in the Construction trade. I wish them well in their new opportunities as they begin to take on the challenges of life beyond secondary college.

I look forward to another successful year in 2014 as this program continues to build students' skills in a vocational area of interest and the eight (8) employability skills valued by employers in; communication, team work, problem solving, technology, initiative and enterprise, planning and organizing, self management and learning.

Year 11 Food Technology students studied topics covering many aspects of the food world. Their practical classes saw students produce a wide variety of products that saw them improve their skills over the year and increase their knowledge of complex processes and ingredient knowledge.

2013, the year the Information Learning Centre (ILC) underwent many positive changes to become a more flexible and inviting learning space.

Shelving was rearranged to better utilize the floor space and make room for the new furniture. This consisted of couches, low tables, large ottomans and large Kloud bags (like a big bean bag). We thank the Saint Ignatius Parents and Friends Association for their kind donation towards the reading cave furniture.

Term 3 began with an expansion to the ILC floor space.

We now have the ColLABor8 space. As the name suggests, the space allows for collaboration for staff and students using a variety of tools and technology. The space includes 2 TV screens which small groups can use, data projector for use and a large whiteboard wall, tables to encourage group work as well as comfortable furniture. Students and staff are using the space for working together, acting out plays, class presentations and general library use.

Opening hours were adjusted this year, opening at recess and all of lunch. Over the year we have seen a steady increase in the number of students using this space at these times. Students are playing chess or games or cards, doing jigsaws, reading, studying and even during the colder months we will, at times, have a movie running in the ColLABor8 space.

ILC Services

We have continued to support the staff and students by increasing our access to digital resources. E-books were introduced into the ILC collection for students and staff to borrow. These are available for loan via the ILC catalogue and can be read on their laptops or mobile devices.

ILC staff have continued to work with classes to expand their research and information literacy needs.

We do this by;

- Assisting with classes, or individuals or small groups
- We continue to provide Research Guides. The Guides are a starting point to students research needs. ILC staff continue to source and add relevant and reliable websites to the Guides. The Guides are accessible via the ILC Homepage with students having access 24/7.
- Access to online databases which we constantly review to ensure they are relevant to our students and staff's learning needs
- Provide a number of visual displays reinforcing researching and information literacy skills

Wider reading continues as we maintain and add to the fiction collection Many new novels and biographies have been added during the year which are quickly being borrowed.

Other Happenings!

Scot Gardner and Mandy Ord - both authors - spent a day each with Year 8 classes. Scot Gardner is an author who has written a number of titles including "The dead I know"; "White Ute dreaming" and "Gravity". Mandy Ord is a graphic artist whose work has appeared in The Age, Meanjin and published "Sensitive Creatures". Scot undertook a writing workshop with four Year 8 classes and Mandy undertook a writing/drawing workshop with four Year 8 classes. We received many positive comments from these workshops.

For the last two terms the ILC has had Student Helpers.

ILC student helpers spend one lunchtime a week to assist with library related jobs such as shelving, processing of new books, assisting with covering of new books. The Student Helpers have assisted with genre stickering the whole fiction collection. This will enable our fiction books to be shelved by the genre or main subject area rather than by author as we currently have. The change will enable students to select books by genre rather than just browsing the shelves to "find a book". We see this as a positive move to make the ILC more student centered and to meet their learning and teaching needs.

The ILC has supported the needs of the wider school by hosting the two day staff conference that was held in August, providing a venue for meetings, and for Feast Day where it became a place for playing games. There were computer games as well as Wii, Playstation and Guitar Hero. Students throughly enjoyed this time.

We've also had a changes in staffing. *Mrs Alaine Kavenagh* who had taken 6 months leave in the first half of the year decided not to return. We thank her for all her hard work over the last number of years. We also thank *Ms Jenni Wilson*, *Mrs Julie Jeramiah* and *Mrs Lynee-Maree Parker* for their contribution whilst working in the ILC

We are looking forward to the new year and new challenges.




