

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This year's College theme was: "**Find your voice**."

Chosen by the Student leaders, this has been a very apt theme for an Ignatian school. It has been an encouragement to our students to listen for the calling, stirrings and learning that will lead them to their true selves. It has encouraged us as their teachers to provide opportunities that will help them do this. This theme has lent itself to many applications throughout the year, and you can see many examples of students finding their voice literally and metaphorically in the "Magis 2015."

Our College has continued to grow positively and further develop this year. Our student enrolment increased to 1,138. We ran our first Year 12 Italian class following the introduction of this subject to Year 7 six years ago. The Immersion Trip program expanded to four trips (two to East Timor, one to visit an indigenous community at North Stradbroke Island and one to Southern India.) A new digital Student Management System, "Xuno," was more fully implemented. Action plans to follow-up on last year's Learning Support and Leadership Team Reviews were developed and the consequent implementations have commenced.

Outcomes included revised Learning Support Coordinator and Deputy Principal roles, another Deputy Principal and a new Leadership Structure. Two new classrooms were installed near the Xavier Centre to cater for the additional Years 7 and 8 classes.

Another addition was the installation of a beautiful bronze sculpture of St Ignatius at the front entry to the College. It is my hope that this striking artistic symbol will be very inspirational for generations of young people who walk through the College's gates.

It is particularly relevant for our youth on their educational journey.

The sculptress, **Meliesa Judge**, explains her inspiration behind this artwork as follows.

"It is interesting to contemplate Ignatius as a young man, as potential still coming into being.

In the new sculpture we will we see him at the start of the journey - still not knowing where his feet will take him, wrong turns and missed directions still ahead, along with the achievements, the formation, the power of the man he became.

We see him listening for the voice of God. This is a time before his friends became followers, before his direction was clear. This is the moment when he has taken those first (painful and broken) steps in the direction of his (still unknown) destiny.

This is one of several pivotal points, in a life lived with a heart open to profound change. I want the sculpture to reflect the young man's determination to act on the insights and understanding of God's action in his life - as it still unravels within him.

Sculpture gives an opportunity to reflect our humanity on a different and more profound level. St Ignatius is a powerful symbol of man seeking a personal relationship with God, of the broken healing, of listening and discerning, of a young man seeking an alternative path through life and of choosing the way of non-violence. It is a profound and wonderful privilege to be able to place an image in the public realm that reflects on these human qualities."

Our co-curricular program enriches and extends the learning experiences our school offers. Through their involvement, students have the opportunity to develop their knowledge and skills, enhance their confidence, explore their strengths and interests, work on weaknesses, improve their ability to work as part of a team, develop friendships and of course to have a very enjoyable time.

The Performing Arts continues to grow at the College. One of the highlights of this year was our biennial production. Congratulations to the cast, musicians and crew on their three very well received performances of "Hairspray the Broadway Musical."

Over one hundred and ten students were involved in a variety of ways that included acting, dancing, playing a musical instrument, singing, costume production, artwork or backstage work. On behalf of our community, I express how proud we are of the students involved.

Another key co-curricular offering is our Sports program. The number of opportunities and students involved has continued to grow. This year we witnessed an increased number of individual and team performances with many students and teams achieving at a very high level and overall a strengthening of an ethos of active participation, sportsmanship/sportswomanship, and school pride.

I commend our Sports Coordinator, **Andrew Philp** and the many staff members and parents who have supported this important program.

The Creative Arts is flourishing. Our Art Gallery has been a vibrant hub throughout the year with a range of high-quality student work on display. This serves to inspire further our Art students to enhance their art, graphics or media studies. Our team of Creative Arts teachers continues to extend the quality of our teaching and learning program in this area.

There are many who have contributed and continue to contribute and provide a strong supporting voice to the College community. To the College Board members whose expertise, collegiality and collaboration under the leadership of Chairperson, **Mr Tony Frizza** provide our College with such positive and purposeful direction, I offer my thanks and appreciation. I also commend the work of the Parents and Friends' Association Committee, under its President, **Mrs Jo Britt**, for its work that produces benefits for all students.

Mr. Michael Exton Principal The excitement surrounding the College's first Immersion Trip was well founded as I reflect on the highlight of the year for me - the trip to Timor Leste at the end of Term Two.

Mr Michael Wright, **Clare Batton** (Destination Dreaming) and I took 15 students to Timor Leste as the first steps in building a relationship with our closest neighbours.

Many aspects of life in Timor Leste are strong indicators of the poverty and daily struggles faced by the Timorese people:

- 50% of the population lives below the international poverty line of \$1.75 per day
- 50% of the population is illiterate
- 30% of the population are in the age cohort of 15-29
- youth unemployment is 43 per cent among urban youth and 20 per cent in rural areas.

However the happy and welcoming nature of the Timorese was a lesson to us all and a stark reminder of how grateful we should be for all that we have in our lives.

We learnt a great deal about the heartbreaking history of Timor - devastated by invasions and left ruined. The purpose of our trip was not to "give aid" but to establish relationships and offer what we have - our friendship and our English skills. We did this primarily at a school on Atauro Island where we spent a week with the locals and our College intends to travel back to this same school on Atauro Island each year to continue to build a bond with the local young people.

We were there to teach them, but we walked away having learnt far more from the experience than we taught them. The students from Saint Ignatius were tremendous on the trip by fully embracing the Ignatian spirit of serving others and they reflected on the Immersion as a life changing experience.

I am so grateful for the opportunity to be part of this first Immersion trip to Timor Leste and I look forward to many more such trips by our school in the years to come.

The student leaders have done fantastic work this year with several fundraising activities to ensure we make the most of opportunites to help others.

The Term One Casual Day raised money for Project Compassion which is operated by Caritas during Lent each year.

The Term Two Casual Day raised \$1,858 and the student leaders decided to donate the money to help the people of Nepal following the terrible earthquake there in April this year. Through Jesuit Mission Australia the money went to St. Xavier's Social Service Center Kathmandu, Nepal

This service is run by the Jesuits in Nepal and provides homes for orphans and the handicapped, as well as drug rehabilitation support and care for those who "come to the door".

On Saint Ignatius Feast Day this year (31st July) more than \$1400 was raised via student donations and also by the food vans we have onsite for Feast Day donating a percentage of their takings from the day.

Seventy percent of the money raised was allocated for Jesuit works in Timor Leste and the student leaders decided this money would go to the Village Meals Program in Railaco, Timor Leste.

This program provides three meals a week to children and the elderly in nearby villages and for many of them, these are the only substantial meals they receive from week to week.

Deputy Principal Mission and Formation; Senior Students' Pastoral Care

In the Footsteps of Saint Ignatius



This year has been a very different one from any of my previous at Saint Ignatius College. Having been a member of staff for the last eight years working closely with curriculum and year level teams, I found myself at the start of 2015 in the humbling position of Acting Deputy Principal [Learning and Teaching as well as Pastoral Care Years 7-9].

This came about as a result of **Ms. Kerry Sidaway's** appointment to the position of Head of Xavier College, Hervey Bay Queensland.

Humbled if not a little daunted by this challenging joint role, I found myself absorbed from the outset by the varied challenges associated with both areas of responsibility. As an educator, I found myself confronted by the central question, 'why do I, or for that matter, any of us teach?' and how is it that we remain enthusiastic about what we have to share with our students and our colleagues? In reflecting upon these questions, I regularly witnessed our teachers and students collective passion to learn and I saw young people in our classrooms engaged with the world around them.

I was repeatedly reminded that learning is a passion that knows no age limits or boundaries. Thank goodness for that!

Learning took on so many forms that it was exciting to see what was possible. Year 7 students experienced a range of new subjects for the first time; Year 8 students relished medieval life as it was presented at Kryal Castle; Year 9 and 10 students sampled a broad range of elective offerings to uncover differing interests while senior students at Years 11 and 12 pursued alternative pathways such as VCE and VCAL, discovering more about their skills and strengths in the process. Learning was not predetermined or confined to activities based only in the classroom and there were many indications that independent study and discovery was at the heart of core school programs.

As a College, we continued to provide our students from Years 7 to 12 with tools to help them take increasing responsibility for their own learning.

The school consolidated a series of tiered workshops supported by Elevate Education that aimed to provide students with critical skills related to time management, purposeful study, improved exam performance and more effective stress management. Technology enhanced learning classes at Year 7 introduced and extended primary students ability to use varied software programs to showcase their learning and the continuing use of data enabled teachers across the school not only to know their students' abilities better but also highlighted areas for focus and future attention.

Information literacy classes were trialled at Year 8 as part of the personal learning program and information evenings at many levels attempted to include the insights of students, parents and teachers to strengthen learning outcomes.

In May, I represented the school at the annual Jesuit and Jesuit Partner Schools curriculum conference at St. Aloysius College in Sydney.

The focus for this two day meeting was to consider what resources and strategies our mutual schools were using to help form staff and students as persons of conscience. It was pleasing to be able to share some of the ways in which Saint Ignatius is attempting to develop this Ignatian value including ethical considerations within existing units of study as well as via social justice responses in and beyond the school grounds.

The school embarked on a Year 10 Curriculum Review in Term 3 with a view to better discern the learning needs of students in the senior section of the College. Eight teachers from a variety of learning areas and with diverse teaching experience formed the review team working with the facilitator, **Mr. Ian Anderson** and team leader **Mr. Chris Dainton**.

This review was set up according to the Change 2 model of investigation and its important work will continue into Terms 1 and 2, 2016.

The school continued to welcome student teachers into the College as a way of developing future educators with the knowledge and skills required to enter this important profession.

Professional development both on site and off site at the school was encouraged for all staff and across the year whole school training was focused on helping teachers construct individual learning plans to better cater for students with diverse learning needs. Recommendations from the 2014 Learning Support Review were developed via a series of short term, medium term and long-term objectives and a subsequent Learning Support policy is currently being developed. Not surprisingly, this year has reinforced more than ever, that student learning and academic performance are inextricably underpinned by student wellbeing and in my other role with responsibilities for Pastoral Care from Years 7 to 9, I have been constantly reminded of that truth.

Presentations on cyber bullying, peer relationships, strategies for coping with grief and loss, workshops delivered by outside organisations such as REACH as well as positive family evenings organised by the school including mother-son and father - daughter nights demonstrate the critical commitment our school attaches to nurturing wellbeing as well as learning needs. Indeed, the decision to appoint a separate Deputy Principal in 2016 with specific responsibility for students bears testament to the vital importance of wellbeing in enhancing learning outcomes.

At this point I would like to acknowledge the skilled, dedicated efforts of our Year Level Coordinators and Wellbeing Coordinators who continually strive to develop resilience, confidence and compassion with the students in their care. In particular, I would like to thank those individual coordinators with whom I have worked most closely this year:

Allison Carlon - Year 7 Coordinator Deb Hodge - Year 8 Coordinator Ben Collyer - Year 9 Coordinator

Special thanks is extended to **Chris Dainton** who stepped into the breach for the second half of Term 4 as Acting Year 7 Coordinator when Allison became ill and unable to return to school.

This was a very hectic time of the year in not only completing the program for 2015 Year 7 students but in coordinating the orientation and management of the incoming 2016students as well. Chris's efforts were tireless in helping to make this challenging transition work so smoothly.

The development of a diverse teaching and learning program at the school is equally challenging and I wish to acknowledge a number of teachers who have helped me to oversee this aspect of the College in 2015. I would especially like to thank the following people for their tireless efforts and expertise:

It has also been exciting for me to work with **Emily Harwood** in her role as Academic Captain and see first hand her ability to reach and influence students.

Her contribution in speaking at subject selection presentations, information evenings and attending scholarship testing sessions has provided tangible evidence of the importance of learning in forming well-rounded men and women able to work for and serve others.

Overall, 2015 has been a very busy but rewarding year and I personally find myself in the exciting position of being appointed Deputy Principal (Learning and Teaching) from 2016.

I am grateful to my colleagues for their invaluable encouragement and support as well as to **Paul Lewis** and **Michael Exton** for their unwavering guidance and leadership.

Teachers are members of a very important profession that is truly a vocation. We teach essential skills and concepts while having the opportunity and responsibility to nurture curiosity and a sense of wonder about the world. In doing so, we develop abilities and talents in our students that underpin their deep worth and uniqueness.

2016 will no doubt be another important year for learning and teaching at the college. New positions have been created including that of Director of Teacher Development, further recognition of the importance of the relationships that we believe clearly exist between teachers and their students if sustained learning is to occur.

The mantra "all students can be successful" is our undeniable challenge and must remain our central goal and purpose at all times.

Wollangarra is a unique outdoor learning program that aims to build leadership skills, develop personal growth and development and learn more about the environment.

It is an 'application only' camp with students being put through a rigorous process in order to be selected. A final group of 12 females and 12 male students accompanied by **Ms Caitlin Doble** and **Mr Ben Collyer** attended Wollangarra in 2015.

Wollangarra is an independent, non-profit organisation situated beside the Macallister River south of Licola, Victoria. To get there from Geelong requires an early start, two trains, a bus and finishing off with a 4WD trip heading up into the mountains.

On arrival at Wollangarra we were dropped off at the front gate and were required to walk a 20-minute journey into the homestead carrying our bags until we reached the flying fox. This was built as the main way to transport food and equipment across the Macalister River.

Students were introduced to the camp leaders and all electronic devices such as phones, watches and lpods were all handed in. Finally a chance for our students to live without technology; a chance to live a simple life.

The first afternoon was spent undertaking hike preparations and community service. This gave students a chance to give back to the Wollangarra community. This involved such things as planting next years potato crop, baking bread and munchies to eat throughout the week, preparing for the hike and even giving the chicken coop a facelift.

The evening involved students cooking dinner on an open fire before retiring to bed to get a good night's sleep prior to the hike.

It was an amazing three days hiking with many breathtaking views anddefinitely well worth the hours walking up and down some very steep tracks.

After sensational weather throughout the first day of the hike it was halfway through the second day when the weather started to change. We started with sun; then it quickly turned into rain, then into hail and finally we had it all the thunder and lightning was crashing around us!

The weather did not improve from there and we were subjected to 24 hours of rain. It was a huge challenge doing the basic things such as getting a fire started or tents up and even keeping the toilet paper dry proved difficult.

All students were fantastic, especially through this extreme weather, working together to achieve success, whilst motivating those who struggled with the demands the hike had to offer, keeping spirits high even when some were in the middle of a breakdown. This was a memorable experience facing challenges and steep learning curves with nobody giving up along the way.

On return to the homestead, it was time to unpack, hang everything out to dry and have a hot shower before dressing up for a lovely dinner of roast lamb and vegetables. Friday consisted of lunch in Heyfield before boarding the bus heading back to Geelong.

Thank you to all the students who participated in this camp. You were absolutely sensational and represented the school superbly.

Thanks also to **Ms Caitlin Doble** for giving up her time to attend the camp. You were fantastic and the students really appreciated your time, efforts and company.

We showcased a variety of student work from a range of year levels. The students' work represents a progression of skills and knowledge developed over a period of time.

Most students found the subject very rewarding, as most tasks are predominantly hands-on and practical.

World Challenge @ Saint Ignatius Byron Mitchell

We believe that life skills, such as resilience, empathy and leadership are developed through real life experience and we enable young people to develop these key skills through powerful student-led expeditions to the developing world.

Through our 28-day World Challenge expeditions, students develop leadership, teamwork and decision -making skills, and change the way they think about the world. Since 2007, Saint Ignatius College students and staff have travelled to Thailand, Cambodia, India, Tanzania, Ecuador and in 2015 we travelled to Morocco subsequent to Mosaic.

World Challenge expeditions are offered to students in Years 9 and 10 every second year.

Outdoor Education

In 2015 the VCE Outdoor & Environmental Studies students undertook practical learning experiences in the Grampians National Park and the Great Otway National Park. These experiences are an important opportunity for students to enrich the classroom theory and consolidate their learning through real life experiences.

The senior students this year had an opportunity to visit Falls Creek Alpine resort on a 2 day trip.

Many students on the trip had never been to the snow before and they had the opportunity to have lessons from expert ski instructors and we saw them all improve their ski and snow board skills over the course of the weekend.

Immersion Programs to Timor Leste

Paul Lewis and Michael Wright

Saint Ignatius College Geelong offers two Immersion experiences to Timor Leste each year for students in Years 10 and 11:

- (i) An Immersion experience organised by the College
- and
- (ii) The Jesuit Province Immersion experience.

Integral to a Jesuit Catholic education are immersion experiences, which challenge students to encounter the realities of the world while reflecting on the values of human dignity and servant leadership.

Students travel to locations where they are exposed to issues of poverty and injustice while experiencing unique cultures and environments. They engage in direct service activities, participate in experiential learning, and make educational site visits all while living in the very communities that they are serving.

Preparation and post-immersion gatherings are an opportunity for students to learn and reflect on the people, issues and realities they encounter, and can provide a way for an experience to become a life-time transformation.

The Immersion Program is grounded in five values:

1. Education

Examining economic, historic, and socio-political issues that affect people and the environment globally.

2. Service

Recognising the importance of meeting immediate needs of people and the environment through service.

3. Spirituality

Exploring the role of faith and spirituality in service and social action.

4. Social Justice

Engaging in social justice and social action efforts with the goal of eliminating injustice for all.

5. Community

Building sustainable relationships with people, communities, institutions and the environment.






Saint Ignatius enters eight teams in the weekly GISSA season in Term Three. All games are played at either the Geelong Netball & Basketball Centre or at The Arena and sometimes even on the centre court.

5. Bellarine Peninsula Winter Basketball Competition

A good preparation for our players wishing to make the VCC teams is to play in the winter competition against local clubs. Once again, we have a growing number of Wolves teams playing in this weekly competition at various local basketball venues.

The standard of junior Basketball at Saint Ignatius College reached new heights in 2015 with five out of six teams making it through to the Victorian College Championships run by Basketball Victoria.

The Victorian College Championships is an open competition for all Secondary Schools to compete in.

Schools compete in selected regional qualifying tournaments at 6 different locations around Melbourne to progress through to the Championship Finals at the Melbourne Sports & Aquatic Centre.

Paul's insightful and valuable life lessons, as well as guidance to win chess games, was appreciated by all players. Some of Paul's memorable teaching quotes include:

There is much to be learned from studying our own games, especially the games we lose.

- It is valuable to see the connection between our games of chess and the "broader picture".
- Never allow your opponent to gain an advantage by diverting you from your task. This can happen in a number of ways (not all of which are legal).
- The better the preparation, the better the performance.
- I do not advocate learning opening moves by rote, as it is important that we always have a logical sound motive for our play.

Snowsports

The 2015 Subaru Australian Interschools Snowsports Championships hosted at Mt Buller involves 213 Schools who will be represented with over 2910 Event Entries! The number of schools now involved in the Nationals has doubled in five years with entries increasing by 50%! Saint Ignatius was represented by two snowsport legends!


Water Polo and Hockey

In 2015 our program of 'immersions' was expanded to include new experiences for our students.

Jesuit Province East Timor Immersion

On Friday June 21st, two of our Year 11 students, **Nicola Gordon** and **Jacob Cuthill** travelled to Dili, East Timor with a group of Year 11 students and teachers from Jesuit and Jesuit Partner Schools from across Australia.

This 'immersion' experience for the students involved them visiting the Jesuit school and touring some of the surrounding areas.

Southern India Immersion

Also in June we introduced a new 'immersion' experience with 16 Year 10 and 11 students heading off to Southern India supported by **Mr Andrew Smith**, **Ms Michelle Chambers** and World Challenge Expeditions.

The students and teachers flew out on the 20th of June and their adventure included trekking, a project to help a local community as well as R and R with an emphasis on the students organising much of the trip themselves.

Timor Leste Immersion

June 21st saw our Timor Leste immersion with 15 students, supported by external provider Destination Dreaming depart. Accompanied by **Mr Paul Lewis** and **Mr Michael Wright**, the immersion builds on the College's exisiting links to Timor Leste and gives the students the opportunity to see first-hand the plight of its people.

The students learn about the history and the harsh realities of daily life in this fledgling country and for many it can be a life changing experience.

North Stradbroke Island Indigenous Immersion

On July 14th, seventeen Year 10 and 11 students headed off on another 'fist time' immersion, this one to Stradbroke Island.

The North Stradbroke Island Indigenous Immersion, supported by Destination Dreaming and two of our staff **Mr Christian Berti** and **Ms Tracey Learmonth**, is designed to give our students a better understanding of the local indigenous community on North Stradbroke and the indigenous issue as a whole, as well as insight into the environmental history of Stradbroke Island and the way the islands eco system operates.

World Challenge Morocco

Supported by our long time immersion partner World Challenge, 41 students in three groups supported by **Mr Byron Mitchell**, **Ms Julia Hall** and **Ms Robyn Frigo** flew out to Morocco two days after our College Mosaic evening in November and returned in late December just prior to Christmas.

They were assisted by **Mr Adam Dickinson**, a member of our well-being team, who, coincidentally, also works for World Challenge.

Following are reports and photos from the immersion held in 2015.





From the beginning our South India expedition was unlike anything else I had ever been involved in.

Two teachers and sixteen students were joined by Jess, our World Challenge expedition leader. Jess divided us into groups, assigning everyone various roles: Leadership; Accommodation; Food; Transport; Well-being; or Budget. As this was 'Our Trip,' we would be responsible for planning each day.

We soon realized leaving the difficult stuff for the adults would just mean we'd have to wait longer to eat or rest in our hotel rooms.

Acclimatising in Fort Kochi for the first few days was a major culture shock with crazy traffic, different foods as well as hot and humid weather without the luxury of air-conditioning. However, these challenging circumstances helped bring us closer together. Teamwork was necessary as we navigated the public transport system. Surprisingly, the local buses do not stop. They just slow down enough for passengers to jump onboard.

Our trekking phase began with a memorable bus trip across the rolling hills of Munnar's tea plantations.

Unfortunately, our first day was cut short after a surprise encounter with a wild elephant, who clearly disagreed with our presence in his territory.

Our practice hike through the cool, spacious Daylesford countryside had not prepared us for the gruelling second day of trekking. Climbing one of the steepest ranges felt like a major achievement... until an elderly woman with thin sandals easily overtook us, while carrying a basket on her head.

Unfortunately, the trip ended with tears for some after a close encounter with leeches.

Our project stage was spent in Thekkady, Kerala.

Our hosts, Zacharias and Romani, at 'Koshy's homestay' were amazing. They cooked three delicious meals a day, helped us plan the next stages of the trip and booked elephant rides for everyone. Zach even took us on a guided tour of the neighboring state, Tamil Nadu, in order to help us experience as much of India as possible. We were so lucky to stay with them. Dinner together at the local restaurant seemed like the least we could do in return for their generous hospitality.

For our project, we had originally planned to build a new room for the nearby primary school, but as asbestos was discovered in those areas, we turned our focus to renovating the school's library. Some of us painted murals and quotes on the walls, while others joined Zach in town to purchase books, sporting equipment, shelves and furniture.

The project also gave us plenty of opportunities to interact with the kids, playing the favourite sport, cricket, as well as other games, after school.

We were also given a chance to teach them a little about life in Australia and to learn about their own lives in return. The students were attentive, eager to learn, and very well behaved (except when we were there distracting them!). Through the project, we were able to give a little back to the community that had welcomed us, and gain an insight into local life in Southern India.

For our last couple of days, we decided to visit Varkala, booking everything ourselves, which was another exercise in money management, decisionmaking and especially patience. The destination was a quiet, beachside town recommended to us by Romani.

Although we were sad to be leaving, everyone was ready to make the most of our rest and relaxation period, shopping at the local markets and taking a morning yoga class. During our time there, we also visited the Hindu Janardanaswamy temple, sometimes called the ancient temple of Vishnu, learning more about India's religious and cultural heritage.

Suddenly, our trip was drawing to an end and we were headed back to Kochi on a classic "sleeper" train. Although it almost left without a few of us, travelling this way was cooler, smoother and quicker than any bus we had taken.

Throughout the expedition, there were numerous difficult moments, and I'm sure that at some points, everyone would have liked to just give up and go home. But no one ever did. We all supported each other, making sure we kept working together as a team.

We learned so much from this trip, not just about the culture and the people of India, but about ourselves.

Most importantly, now we know that not even a rampaging elephant, a woeful lack of Wi-Fi, an army of leeches, or a lost passport can stop us!

We arrived in Timor, tired and hot, but as we travelled through Dili to our accommodation on the first night, we were shocked at the amount of poverty we witnessed, but also amazed at how scenic the town and surrounds were.

After a few days in Dili exploring local sites and learning about Timorese history and life style we travelled by boat to the amazing Atauro Island.

It was luscious and green and every bit a tropical island. The people on the Island were happy and treasured their home.

Our purpose on this Island was to go to the local SOLS (the English teaching school) and teach English and build a relationship with the students.

We did this by playing basic games, speaking English and doing word activities. The relationship we made with the students was one that will never be forgotten or lost.

It was incredibly hard to say goodbye and we all stay in touch with them.

We were there to teach them, but I think we walked away having learnt from the experience far more than we taught them!

We can't tell you that everything about Timor is "just perfect", because it isn't. They live different lives to us and they are still rebuilding their communities and finding themselves following the utter devastation of the Indonesian occupation and their struggle for independence.

Now that we have been to Timor and have initiated a relationship with the SOLS school and the students, we ask students in younger year levels to seriously consider doing this trip when your chance comes along as we plan to continue the relationship for many years – and build genuine community between ourselves, and one of our nearest neighbours.

We guarantee, you will not regret it!

We took a plane to Brisbane on Tuesday where we met Gerard, who was our Destination Dreaming leader, and caught a ferry over to the island.

When we arrived we set up our tents at Amity Point camping grounds. After we were settled, aboriginal elder **Aunty Joan** met us and told us a bit about herself and did a Welcome to Country Ceremony to welcome us. That night Aunty Joan came to dinner with us at the Sea Shells cafe, where we ate every night.

Day 2 - Wednesday 15th July:

After eating at Sea Shells cafe for breakfast, we began the day with a cultural workshop run by one of the Aboriginal men on the Island **Matty Burns**.

We learnt and saw how the Quandamooka people survived off the land as well as the tools they made and used and how they hunted.

We walked through the bush and Matty showed us all the plants, trees and shrubs that can be used for medicinal purposes, such as using Dugong oil and the smoke cypress trees to cure chest infections brought over due to the colonisation of the island.

After lunch the Men took off with Matty, Gerard and Mr Berti to learn more about the Aboriginal men's business We worked as a group and made fishing spears as well as learning all about the history of the men's initiations and tribal standings.

The women went off with Aunty Joan and her daughter Sonya to learn about the women's business and traditional weaving where we made a basket and some bracelets out of traditional materials.

Day 3 – Thursday 16th July:

On Thursday we headed out to Dunwich Primary School where we were split into groups and helped out in the classrooms.

The kids were really curious and asked a lot of funny questions like "what island do you live on?". We left the primary school after snack and went to the Aboriginal Housing Co-Op and looked at all the photos of past aboriginal peoples of the community.

Later that day we had the opportunity to screen print an aboriginal whale or turtle onto a shirt and we had to do a drawing in a hand outline, which got burnt onto a canvas. Day 4 – Friday 17th July:

On the fourth day of the trip we revisited the primary school to work with the kids and showed them some presentations we put together on the area of Geelong, our culture and our school.

After a few hours we headed to Point Lookout which is a major attraction on the island, where we learnt traditional dancing.

For the dance our faces were painted white in the shape of a manta ray to signify the symbolism of the dances to the Quandamooka people.

We then walked around the three gorges, where we saw dolphins, whales, sea turtles and even a shark according to **Alyce** and **Taylah**.

Day 5 – Saturday 18th July:

We journeyed to the community hall to learn more about Stradbroke's environmental history and the way the islands eco system operates from one of the local environmental scientists, **Jan**.

After learning about the island we set off to experience it ourselves walking the track to blue lake and then making our way back to brown lake where we spent the afternoon swimming and learning more from Aunty Joan about Stradbroke's rich aboriginal history and what landmarks such as blue and brown lake meant to them.

Day 6 – Sunday 19th July:

On Friday, the last day of our immersion trip, Aunty Joan bid us all farewell after telling us about her life, including her nomination for Australian of the Year. Later on we flew home.

On behalf of all the students who participated in the trip we would like to thank **Mr Berti** and **Ms Learmonth** for taking care of us and giving up their time.

This captures the essence of why the College embarked on the adventure that is World Challenge way back in 2006.

Our most recent long haul expedition to Morocco was the College's fifth such trip and included many uniquely North African experiences, such as visiting the Souks, Moroccan cooking classes, camel trekking in the Sahara Desert and learning Arabic phrases.

World Challenge

Each of three teams worked with a local communities to assist them with projects of benefit. Our students provided employment for local skilled tradesmen including bricklayers, concreters and plumbers. All students had a real sense of achievement being able to look at the tangible difference that they had made to the communities that we were working in.

They also developed relationships with local kids and the local staff that supported our teams on the projects.

Trekking makes up a large part of the expedition and, for many, it was the biggest physical and mental challenge they have faced in their lives.





What an amazing year for the AOC students!

Under the direction of a very dedicated and passionate team of teachers, 2015 was full of a wide range of practical and educational learning activities that have challenged students in many ways. This year, VCAL has grown to include two classes at Year 11 and one Year 12 class.

Congratulations to all the teachers and Learning Support Officers (Mr. Ian Anderson, Ms. Leesa Snookes, Ms. Kirsty Allan, Mr. John Clatworthy, Ms. Julia Hall, Mrs. Sarah Purnell, Ms. Sue Traynor, Mr. Christian Berti, Ms. Deanne Allen-Emery, Ms. Donna Quigley and Ms. Freda Gray) and students for the work required in maintaining the high level of quality within both programs.

Throughout the year, the Year 11 group worked on a variety of projects incorporating outside organisations as well as groups within the College.

The main themes were around Environment/ Sustainability and Disability. The work with Scope Vic was a highlight. The excursion to Highpoint Industries enabled the students to work, engage and communicate with people with a disability.

Students attended the "Hoddle Waddle" - an amazing race activity around Melbourne learning important navigation and mathematical skills.

Our ongoing partnership with Nelson Park School involved several activities, incorporating skills learnt.

We designed a "Queenscliff Waddle", where our students worked closely with students from Nelson Park to navigate their way around. In addition, a fund raising activity known as the "12 Hour Walka-thon" enabled students to challenge themselves, achieving both personal and team goals.

The Blackwood Specialist School Outdoor Education Camp included a community service focus providing students with the opportunity to demonstrate their learnt employability skills and work together in a different setting to achieve desired outcomes.

The overall achievement in this themed unit provided a huge amount of personal growth and enabled students to fulfill the College's motto of "Conscience, Competence and Compassion."

The Edible Garden project took a different direction in 2015. It still consisted of maintaining and harvesting of produce, culminating in a 3-course meal for some staff at the College. It involved students working in teams and demonstrating effective organisation and communication skills. A Pizza day was also organised for all College staff - a real treat. The main focus was the development of a Mothers Day stall of hand made concrete pots, made and painted by the AOC students.

Students also had the opportunity to up skill in a range of short courses: RSA, Barista, Safe Food Handling and Level 2 First Aid. These new skills, combined with their Structured Workplace Learning (SWL) placements or their School-based Apprenticeship (SbA) commitments, provided students with vocational skills. The up-skilling day was extended to include workshops on Mindfulness, Resilience and Brain training which are all vital skills for students as they enter the work place.

Our Year 12 cohort also worked around two themes – The Welfare of Foster Children and Animal Welfare / Responsible Pet Ownership. These themes were linked to a range of external organisations.

The Welfare of Foster Children was a joint partnership project with Yuille Park Community College, St Thomas Primary School and Cottage by the Sea, Queenscliff. The partnership with Cottage by the Sea enabled our students to work with primary aged students organising a range of activities.

Grade 5 and 6 students were given a task of designing and constructing a cottage with the following question in mind, "What does Cottage by the Sea mean to you?" The culmination of the "sea of cottages" was a definite highlight for the 'Awareness Day' and included a variety of different activities where the students learnt and gained an understanding of the community support network for these children. This was a highly rewarding project that coincided with the 125th Anniversary of Cottage by the Sea.

The second theme of Animal Welfare / Responsible Pet Ownership was an opportunity for our students to work closely with Geelong Animal Society GAWS and Parks Victoria. The classroom at times resembled a manufacturing assembly line as the students created dog collars using recycled belts and ties. The students also produced a documentary aimed to create an awareness of issues such as animal cruelty, puppy farms and the care of both domestic pets and native animals. Their research included information not only from a global perspective but also analysed issues within Australia and local areas, in particular the Bellarine Peninsula.

This film was shown at GPAC as part of the Youth Voices Program which coincided with RUOK Day.

In September the students displayed their event management skills to produce a successful Movie Night at the Potato Shed.

Competence Conscience Compassion

Using a combination of problem solving skills and mathematical concepts the students also embraced a paving project. The creation of a contemporary outdoor learning space including a vertical garden was the end product, which the students utilised throughout the year.

Year 12 students undertook either their Structured Workplace Learning or SbA commitments for the entire year. Their every Friday commitment continued to develop their Employability and Vocational Skills to the point where some have been successful in obtaining work or have been accepted into a higher level course.

I would like to congratulate these students on their achievements and wish them well for their future.

I know the learning gained from their VCAL studies will benefit them in the coming years as they continue to develop into responsible young men and women.

I look forward to another year in 2016 as we continue to build on the success of preceding AOC programs. The employability skills gained by participating in an applied learning pathway including communication, team work, problem solving, using technology, initiative and enterprise, planning and organising, self management and learning will assist in gaining fulltime work or success in further studies.

This year the Year 7 students were given the opportunity to meet acclaimed Australian young adult fiction writer Scot Gardner. Scot spoke about his novels, the process of creating stories, and entertained the students with humorous stories from his own experience. Each student also took part in a tutorial on creative writing and developing writing ideas. The students' positive response highlighted how much of an impact being involved in a variety of learning experiences can have.

As part of the Year 8 study of poetry, a presentation by award winning "Slam Poet" **Emilie Zoe Baker** took place for each class in the ILC.

Students participated in an impromptu Poetry Slam competition using various childrens books as their source material, creating vibrant and engaging recitations displaying the versatility of language.

By taking poetry beyond the page and giving it life, students were able to experience the power and beauty of the spoken word.

As in previous years the study of Shakespeare was an integral part of the Year 9 and 10 English programs. AusVels highlights the importance of understanding how language changes over time, which is examined in the study of Elizabethan vocabulary and syntax as well as Shakespeare's impact on the development of the English language.

Students in both Years 9 and 10 enjoyed dressing up to act out the plays in classes, reading aloud, viewing classic and modern film interpretations and experiencing a live professional performance where selected students acted on stage as part of the performance troop.

This year we were very fortunate to have **Cate Kennedy** come and talk to the Year 12 Literature students about her collection of short stories "*Dark Roots*" which our students studied as part of their Literature study. To have an author who is currently booklisted come to the College was an incredibly valuable opportunity for our students.

The year 12 LEAP students were also privileged to meet local best selling author **Ellie O'Neil** and discuss the process of creating, writing and publishing. For students with an interest in a future writing career this was a great experience.

At Saint Ignatius College we encourage students to continue to learn beyond the classroom and core classes by providing many extra curricular activities in which they can become involved. This year saw Saint Ignatius College well represented at the Debating Association of Victoria's Geelong Region schools' debates.

Our Year 10 Debating Team ventured to Clonard College for their opening debate against the home team. Taking the affirmative position, our team combined well to argue "that we should have compulsory military service."

Our opponents were well prepared and presented some compelling points in the negative. Alexander **Delany** introduced the affirmative case very capably.

His arguments were all well developed and carried much weight with the adjudicators. Our second speaker, Cooper Seiffert, gave a polished performance characterized by the effective use of inclusive language to earn the accolade of Best Speaker overall.

As third speaker, **Dylan Crawley** delivered a superb rebuttal of the opponents' case and summed up our case with confidence. The adjudicator awarded the round to the Saint Ignatius College Team by the narrow margin of two points. Thank you to our reserve speaker Rhys Lowther who chaired the debate.

Due to some forfeits, our next debate took place in the secret topic round at Geelong Grammar.

The team had one hour in which to prepare the case to support "that we should ban fur".

Creative thinking and teamwork came to the fore during this time to ensure that the team's case was clear. Alexander was commended for the development of the matter in his opening speech where he established a strong case in the affirmative. The adjudicator complimented Rhys for the frank and honest manner of his delivery as second speaker. Rhys' arguments were highly effective and featured the use of some engaging and humorous rhetorical questions. He was awarded Best Speaker for this debate. Cooper summed up our team's case very capably in a measured and calm manner. In a close contest, our opponents were awarded the debate by the narrow margin of one point.

Leading up to round five, our team prepared and rehearsed an excellent case against the proposal "that we should abolish trial by jury".

We were confident that we would do well but unfortunately our opponents also forfeited this debate.

Although we did not make it to the finals this year, our students learnt a great deal about effective teamwork and exercised their critical thinking and creativity. They developed their confidence in being able to articulate a point of view convincingly and with poise. Congratulations to our four representatives for their excellent work. The team is looking forward to further opportunities at senior level in 2016.

Students are invited to join the program after a review of several areas of their performance, including their Semester 1 and 2 Year 11 English results and their attitude to study.

Seventeen students participated in the class in 2015, making the commitment to meet once a week after school throughout their academic year.

The sessions focused on the area of study being covered in mainstream English classes at the time.

Students engaged in discussion that encouraged them to challenge and extend their thinking.

A busy, vibrant faculty like the Food Technology one does not operate to such a high standard without the wonderful work of the staff.



The purpose of Health and Physical Education is to teach the whole student, not just their body and movement.

Physical Education provides the opportunity to teach students about movement, strategies, teamwork, problem solving and health related fitness.

There are hundreds of physical, social, emotional and academic benefits of being physically active every day for our students. Health Education is very important to enhance student's wellbeing and quality of life. Health Education provides students with knowledge on how to prevent disease, injury and illness while also including values and goals.

At Saint Ignatius College the students have enjoyed a safe, caring learning environment that catered for individual learning styles. Students focussed on improving their wellbeing, physical fitness, decisionmaking process, community activities and programs, equity and fair play during physical activities and to make better choices for a healthier lifestyle.

The school's excellent and beneficial Physical Education Program continued in 2015, which incorporated the Fundamental Movement Skills program for the junior students. The Year 7 and 8 Students focused on practices that recognised building relationships, personal identity, decision making, how to interact with others and food choices and issues.

The Health Curriculum covered the following areas; Benefits of Physical Activity, Nutrition, Strategies and Tactics in improving performance, Understanding Personal Identity and Changes and Challenges. Some of the practical units included; Adaptive Sports, Netball, Football Codes, Athletics, Cross - Country, Bat Tennis, Fitness Evaluation, Soccer, T-Ball, Cricket, Korfball and Basketball.

At Year 9 and 10 the students focused on factors that influenced the development of their personal identity and values. They utilised training methods to improve their fitness level and participation in sports, games, recreational and leisure activities.

The Health Curriculum covered the following concepts; Rethinking Drinking, Mental Health and Communication, Relationships, Outdoor Adventure, Australia's Health, Drug Education, Driver Safety and Sport Injuries. Some of the practical units included; Aquatics, Softball, Volleyball, Fitness Evaluation, Football Codes, Badminton, Korfball, Golf, Surfing and Lawn Bowls.

The senior students worked hard in the Physical Education Units 1 to 4 and Health and Human Development Units 1 to 4. Participation in physical activity and opportunity for students to investigate Health and Human development across the lifespan provided opportunities for students to reflect on factors that affected performance and participation in physical activity, as well as enhancing an individual's quality of life.


Physical Education Units 3 and 4 excursion to Exercise Research Australia (ERA) engaged our students using an interactive approach based around the curriculum covered in Units 3 and 4. The purpose of the excursion was to allow students to gain first hand experience of how to apply key concepts to athletic performance, to further enhance their understanding of school assessed coursework using laboratory activities and to work with leading Australian sports scientists in a nationally recognised testing facility.

Competence Conscience Compassion

Miles Cole, who is a well known, London - based illustrator and editorialist said: 'When we stop being citizens and began to think of ourselves only as consumers, we relinquished thousands of years of human development'.

The renowned scientist **E. O. Wilson** recently described the humanities as "the natural history of culture, and our most private and precious heritage".

The Humanities are the study of what makes us human, of what it means to be human. As they penetrate every aspect of existence, they can, and should, intersect with the natural and social sciences, but literature, history, art, music, languages, theatre, film – and yes, television and computer games – are the stories and ideas through which we express our humanity.

We understand ourselves and our world through the telling of stories. Visual dramas teach us sympathy, empathy, pity, encouraging us to break out of our self-indulgent shells. They explore ethical issues, ask challenging questions, inform the way we view each other. Today we live in a culture more defined by images and stories than ever before.

Given this, it is vital that we approach the media, advertising and marketing discourses that influence and often manipulate us with critical thinking.

We need improved communication skills; no one is born with them, and just chatting with your family and friends does not teach the precision of language needed to negotiate and reframe our complicated world. In a global age, we need to understand other societies. Anyone who has ever studied a foreign language knows that different phrases can prompt new perspectives and open our eyes to cultural values; studying foreign languages also improves mastery of our own. This rule holds by analogy more generally: when we learn about other people, we also learn about ourselves.

The politicians and corporations telling us that the Humanities do not matter are, by no coincidence, the same people who think of us only as workers and consumers, not as citizens or individuals, and who strip away our human rights, one by one.

If we agree that the Humanities do not matter, or fail to challenge this assessment, we are colluding in the very practices that reduce our humanity, that impinge upon all the other ways in which we can enrich our lives, our abilities to express our creative individuality. Until we reconsider what it means to lead a truly satisfying life, what the ancient Greeks considered the "good life" - who are by no coincidence the people who invented the study of the Humanities we should not be surprised if we have the politicians and plutocrats we deserve. Why should any politician seek to challenge the source of this power?

The Humanities conserve and safeguard those aspects of our being that intersect with the meanings of human existence beyond industry.

A certain playwright was said to love humanity as a concept but to have less time for human beings.

The same can be said of our so-called leaders, whose lofty rhetoric in support of humanity is belied by their contempt for the study of the Humanities.

That said, as the historian **James Truslow Adams** wrote some years ago, it is absurd to think that the powerful will abandon their power "to become spiritual leaders of a democracy that despises spiritual things".

When we stopped being citizens and began to think of ourselves - or rather, each other - only as consumers, we relinquished thousands of years of human development. How can we sustain our civilisation if we don't understand how it works?

How can we interpret Magna Carta and defend our rights if no one reads Latin? How will we protect our own laws? How can we hope for transcendence in a secular age if we give up on beauty?

Even in instrumentalist terms, the humanities represent 5,000 years of free research and development in what it means to be human. I think we should make use of that.

The Humanities are where we locate our own lives, our own meanings; they embrace thinking, curiosity, creation, psychology, and emotion. The humanities teach us not only what art is for, but what life might be for, what this strange existence might mean.

What kind of humans would think that the Humanities don't matter? We need the advanced study of Humanities so that we might, some day, become advanced humans.

At Saint Ignatius College we teach that the Humanities do matter. We believe that to know is to understand and we do this through presenting a broad range of topics and activities, from learning about our planet and all it entails to the history of human conflict and the impact it has on our lives and those of our fellow citizens of the world. From Year 7 through to Year 10, and then, if selected as a VCE subject, the Humanities forms a vital part of every student's learning and it is our hope that this learning enriches the lives of all our students.

Whether this be through experiencing a 'Medieval' Day at Year 8, a 'Beach Clean-Up Day' at Year 9, Work Experience at Year 10 or 'University Lectures' on the Russian and French Revolutions at Year 12, there are so many opportunities for 'hands-on' learning activities.

We are, indeed fortunate to have a wonderful group of Humanities teachers who share a passion for all that this study entails.

It is our fervent belief that through the study of Humanities we create better world citizens, who will, in turn, we hope, create a better world.

We were also lucky enough to have a special visit from Geelong Regional Libraries Co-operation staff to talk to our Anime Club and work with these students.
















2015 has once again been a busy and enjoyable year for Language students across the school.

Saint Ignatius College Geelong will provide opportunities for students to:

- develop leadership skills and experience leadership in a variety of contexts
- understand the concept of servant leadership and put this into practice.

The school will encourage such leadership through service in the wider community during, and after, their school years.

All students show leadership. All students are encouraged to develop their leadership.

Leadership can be shown in 'the little things' that may or may not be noticed. Leadership can be displayed with or without a designated title.

A tangible way of showing a commitment to a leadership that reflects our school's mission statement is by completing community service.

In 2015, 35 students (our service champions) were awarded Lions Young Leaders in Service Awards.

Collectively these 35 students, alone, completed 2796 hours of community service. Many more completed the suggested (5 hours for Year 7 and 10 hours for Years 8.12) number of hours of community service.

In 2015 the theme, chosen by our College captains and College vice captains at the annual Jesuit Student Leaders Conference in Sydney, was 'Find your Voice'; as much about allowing and encouraging others to find their voice as finding our own voice.

Leadership development seminars attended during the year included; the VicSRC regional conference held in Geelong, the Halogen National Student Leaders Conference in Melbourne, 'Leaders- Light the Way'. Catholic Secondary School Symposium in Melbourne and the Jesuit Student Leaders Conference in Hervey Bay, Queensland.

The exact number of student leadership positions within the school is difficult to know but with two class captains, a justice captain and environment captain in every homeroom, SRC representatives, Ignatian leaders, Portfolio captains, house captains and house vice captains, College captains and College vice captains the number is more than 235.

Community service

"At Saint Ignatius College our vision and mission is to form young people of competence, conscience and compassion who will be of service to others in the community.

As part of the Ignatian tradition we are called to strive for the magis – a calling for more universal good, more effective means, more generous service to others and the greater glory of God. "

Students in Year 7 are encouraged to complete at least 5 hours of community service and all other year levels at least 10 hours. Completion of the minimum time is acknowledged on end of year reports.

Students are encouraged to take up opportunities to be of service when they present, both at school and outside of school.Some students complete far more than the minimum and this is acknowledged through our 'Lions Young Leaders in Service Awards' program. Students receive a 'Silver Seal Award' for 50-100 hours and a 'Gold Seal Award' for 100+ hours.

This year we had 35 students (2796 hours of community service) who received a 'Lions' award. This has grown from 4 students in 2013 and 24 in 2014. Champions of community service!

Literacy is the core of a student's ability to learn and succeed in school and beyond.

Literacy underpins the Saint Ignatius College curriculum, developing students' abilities to speak, listen, read and write for a wide range of purposes, using language to learn and communicate, to think, explore and organize.

Explicit teaching of literacies in the classroom enables students to express themselves clearly orally and in writing, enhancing and enriching their learning in all subjects.

Literacy acquisition is an important focus at the College because it is integral and pivotal to effective continuing advancement across all years of schooling.

The College delivers a literacy-based curriculum where teachers take responsibility in delivering quality education embedded in the context of subject teaching.

Teachers see literacy teaching as an essential part of their repertoires as they recognize that literacy skills are essential for students to reach their potential in school.

As students move through secondary school they experience increasingly complex and specialized tasks and texts, therefore embedding explicit literacy instruction in the context of subject learning is an important priority in promoting high standards.

The College regards literacy acquisition as an important learnt capability, accordingly introducing an Information Literacy Skills Program linked to the curriculum, for Year 8 students.

Such literacy initiatives at the junior level, ensures that students develop essential skills that will support them throughout their future schooling. Targeted withdrawal group intervention sessions for students identified through formative assessment, have also been established that cater to individual requirements and learning styles, progressing the literacy skills of these students at their varying levels.

Conversely, PAT-R, AGAT and NAPLAN testing reveals those students who have high-level literacy skills; these students are intellectually challenged in order to equip them with strategies to advance various facets of their literacy capabilities.

The College is a member of the CEOM Curriculum Literacies and Secondary Literacy Network, which actively supports the personal literacy capabilities of teachers increasing their explicit knowledge about literacy, their professional practice and schoolcommunity partnerships.

VCE Mathematical Methods Units 1 and 2 was introduced into our Year 10 program this year.

Congratulations to the brave students who undertook this challenge. It was a big step! I am confident that the challenges faced will be of long-term benefit for our students and that problem solving skills and resilience were developed. In 2016 they will be the first group of Specialist Math Units 1 and 2 students going through. This will provide a solid foundation for success in Units 3 and 4 Mathematical Methods and help our students achieve their best.

This year saw 'Maths Help' sessions at lunchtimes being offered weekly in both the senior school and middle school to give students a chance to get some extra tuition. The staff dedication to this is admirable. Special thanks to **Ms Robyn Frigo** for her work in the middle school. Assistance from the 2015 Academic Captain **Emily Harwood** was also valuable.

We continue to use ICT in the classroom with students in Years 7 to 9 undertaking tasks using 'Geogebra'. This program has interactive geometry and algebra that helps students develop their skills in visual thinking. 'Excel' has also been a valuable program and our students have become competent in creating graphs using this program.

Our text book allows for access to a digital copy of the text book that students can download onto their laptops, thus reducing the need for heavy school bags.

The online Mathematics program, '*Mathletics*' continues to be a valuable learning tool. With access to NAPLAN tests, LIVE Mathletics and curriculum based questions there is always an opportunity for more Mathematics to be practised!

In the Middle School there has continued to be a focus on providing a variety of assessment to make mathematics more relevant and interesting.

Year 8 students have collected data around typing speeds and the Year 7 students have created decimals games and analysed real-life data around typical Australian households.

We ask that parents continue to support the 'Mathletics' program. Any problems accessing the material can be addressed to the Mathematics teacher or by contacting Mathletics directly through the email address on the website. They are very prompt and efficient in replying.

At VCE level our results from 2014 were most impressive and keep improving each year.

Scores of over 40 in Further Mathematics were achieved by Dayne Diment, Jessica Dougherty, Nathaniel Gravener, Emily Harwood, Liam Kearney, Rylan McCracken, Benjamin Potter, Hannah Sjodin and Kyla Thebes.

In Mathematical Methods **Cooper Moody, Michael Peace** and **Nicholas Vella** achieved scores above 40.

In 2016 **Mr Peter Grull** becomes the new Mathematics Learning Area Leader. I am confident that he will do great work in this position and continue the upward trend in results and participation that we have witnessed in recent times.

Students and staff began to arrive, discussed arrangements for the day, all to the sounds of tuning instruments echoeing around the school from the gym, School of Performing Arts and the Senior quad. Cricket was underway with a friendly cricket match taking place between our students and Geelong Grammar School cricketers on the oval.

As the Open Day itself began, the College was literally inundated with interested families -1800 mums, dads, grandparents and children.

The first Information session was quickly filled to the music of the ensembles and bands. Families heard from Principal **Michael Exton**, College Captains **Genevieve Nicholls** and **Harry Stannard**, both reflecting on their journey through their years at the College. **Allison Carlon**, Head of Year 7 addressed the families and two Year 7 students **Kiera Galan** and **Ethan O'Brien** spoke about their transition from primary school and how well they had settled in.

After these sessions, students and staff were taking tours around the college and visitors seemed delighted to view the amazing array of things to see, do and hear from both students and staff. There were forty-two activities, workshops presentations and displays to engage and inform families. There were games on the basketball court, Year 7 and 8 activities, Social Justice, Humanities, RE and Faith and Spirituality displays and Wider reading presentations all in the Xavier Centre (Year 7 and 8 precinct).

On to the MacKillop Centre-the VCE Centre, where LOTE-Indonesian and Italian was the first "port of call" with displays and activities, then onto the Careers Information & VCE display and Mathematics - Mathletics, CAS Calculators & Resources.

Visitors could observe the modern facilities of the Food Technology centre with staff busy preparing visitor afternoon tea, and student and staff lunches. Families finished their day with afternoon tea in the senior rooms and many took the opportunity to make further enquiries including queries regarding bus transport.

A very special addition to our Open Day, a fitting end to Catholic Education week and of great significance to the College was the unveiling and Blessing of the recently sculptured statue of Saint Ignatius situated at the entrance of the College. It is in a newly paved and beautified area with rounded boulders from South Australia. The granite boulders symbolically reflect the mountains at Montserrat where St Ignatius began his new life as is portrayed in the sculpture. This is the time in his life where he laid down his sword, gave away a life of privilege, put on the clothes of a beggar and began walking to Manresa, to start a life of transformative meditation.



Science at Saint Ignatius College has provided many opportunities for students to investigate a wide range of ideas through experimentation and investigations that brings science to life.

Students were challenged to understand the relevance and importance of science in the wider world and to consider how they can contribute to the scientific developments and innovations of tomorrow.

This year all Year 7 - 10 students have made scientific posters which communicated their skills in developing scientific method and analysing their results. Areas that were investigated were levers in Year 7, nutrients found in cereals in Year 8, the effectiveness of wind turbines in Year 9 and motion in Year 10.

Science has continued to grow within the College with more VCE and elective classes being on offer in 2015.

Throughout the year many additional activities were offered that students participated in and were actively engaged by. All Year 7 Students attended an incursion by StarLab. Students were able to explore our solar system with an emphasis on the Earth, Sun and Moon. The presentation provided students with a fantastic visual experience that will assist them in their studies.

All Year 8 students participated in an incursion by **Prof Bunsen**. The presentation successfully increased student's fascination of science and demonstrated to them how we use science everyday.



As part of the Year 9 Melbourne Camp, students visited the Melbourne Aquarium and learnt about Victoria's endangered marine species.

This knowledge was later used in the creation of a website demonstrating the threats to a particular species and the actions to take to prevent their extinction.

The Year 9 Marine Science classes investigated the local marine habitats and applied their learning in a range of engaging ways.



The Year 10 Environmental Science class explored their local environments of the open grassy woodlands and wetlands at the Serendip Sanctuary.

They also went to the Werribee Open Range Zoo to explore its habitat and the effect it has on animals living in it. Students discovered how animals and plants interact within those habitats and applied fieldwork skills to collect data.

The Unit 2 Biology classes visited Barwon Bluff to investigate its ecosystem and the interactions that occur within it. Students collected data from the habitats and microhabitats of several species and enjoyed a day of learning outside the classroom.

Students taking Unit 2 Physics went to Science Works to see the Astrophysics Show. They investigated the nature and origin of the Universe by viewing stars and astronomical objects in The Planetarium.

The Unit 3 Chemistry class visited The Gordon to investigate and to develop the skills to use instruments involved in the chemical analysis.

Students undertaking Unit 4 Biology went to The Gordon to develop laboratory skills in DNA technologies. They cut DNA into fragments and used gel electrophoresis to examine the genes of six individuals.

Science and Engineering Challenge

A team of Year 10 students competed in the Science and Engineering Challenge held at Deakin University.

Students competed in various activities that awarded points for their ability to work cooperatively and to create solutions to engineering challenges.

Some of the challenges that students faced were bridge building, hover crafts, gliders, earthquakeresistant buildings, electrical grids, satellite dishes and car suspensions. All students competed to a high level and had a great time competing in their group tasks.

Big Science Competition

Selected students from Years 7 · 10 competed in the Big Science Competition.

2015 has undoubtedly been a dynamic and rewarding year for the staff and students associated with the Social Justice Committee.

We have been involved in numerous rewarding and worthwhile College and community activities including the Christ Church Meals Program, College Open Day, Senior School Winter Appeal and the Winter Sleep Out, Operation Christmas Child, Refugee Holiday Programs and the College Christmas Appeal.

The Christ Church Community Meals Program is the chief way our students who are interested in volunteering their time can contribute to the community. Over the course of 2015 we have had close to one hundred students across all year levels participate and help to provide meals for those in need in our local community, including the Year 10 music students who both performed and served.

The Meals Program is organised and run by Christ Church in Geelong whose members have been doing excellent work for over twenty years, providing over half a million meals during that time. It is also the only program of its kind in Australia to provide a free medical service to its patrons. We are exceedingly proud of our association with the caring and faith filled people at Christ Church.

The Senior Winter Appeal was a great success this year, thanks to our diligent Social Justice Committee. We had collection points located across the school, gathering tinned goods, warm clothing and blankets to be donated to St Vincent de Paul.

The response from students in all areas of the College was both pleasing and humbling.

Students also had the opportunity to spend time with local refugee children in the April, July and September holidays. Students from Saint Ignatius, along with the other Catholic Colleges in Geelong attended the Refugee Holiday programs in terrific numbers, enabling students to mix not only with pupils from other Colleges but more importantly with new refugees in our community.

These children range in age from five to seventeen and many not have been in Australia very long at all. Speakers from Diversitat also provided our students with interesting and important contextual knowledge about the backgrounds from which many of the refugees originate. However, the main focus of the program is to provide and fun and activity filled day for our community's refugee children. Arguably a less fun experience, but no less significant was this year's Winter Sleep Out.

Thirty senior students and six teachers braved a cold August night to not only raise awareness of homelessness, but also get a feeling themselves of what life is like for Australia's 100 000 homeless.

Students and teachers built cardboard shelters for the evening in a bid to recreate the difficult sleeping arrangements faced by 1 in 200 Australians every night. Together students raised over \$2000 for the Christ Church Meals Program, helping to feed and clothe those in our community who are less advantaged.

2015 has proven to be another big year for The Arts Department here at Saint Ignatius College.

In 2014 we said farewell to long serving staff member **Mrs Chris Wood** and this year welcomed two new staff members, **Mrs Denise Pennings** and **Ms Ruth Nolan**. Both staff members bring a wealth of knowledge and expertise to our department.

Both in and outside of the classroom there has been much learning happening.

Year 11 and 12 Studio Art students attended an excursion to Top Arts at the National Gallery of Victoria, Powerhouse Museum in North Geelong and Boom Gallery in Newtown. This made for a very busy day. It gave the students the opportunity to visit a public gallery, alternative art space and a commercial art gallery in preparation for their end of year exam. VCE Media Students attended Top Media at the NGV and Visual Communication Students attended AG ideas and Top Design.

In October Ms Nolan assisted with the 'Active Travel Route To School' exhibition on the rail trail in Drysdale. Saint Ignatius students worked with students from St Thomas primary and Bellarine Secondary College.

The event was organized by The City of Greater Geelong, with representatives from each school, Geelong Traffic Engineering Unit and Healthy Together Geelong. Students from all three schools chalked the shared path between Reserve and Andersons Roads with 'active travel' themed artwork.

Approximately 140 students, staff and families walked, or rode their bikes and scooters home from school along the new active travel route. With more people walking and riding to and from the schools (even part of the way), the project hopes to see a reduction in traffic and parking congestion at pick up and drop off times along Peninsula Drive.

More people walking and riding will also support the safety, health and wellbeing of our children and community. A great initiative and project for Saint Ignatius to be involved in.

Mrs Pennings coordinated her Year 9 art students in creating a public art project, an installation inspired by the work of American artist **Keith Haring**.

The focus and theme for this collaborative work were social issues of the 21 Century. Students researched images and issues to successfully bring together powerful images of key issues relevant to their generation. Students magically transformed a humble cardboard box into a wonderful colour artwork voicing a powerful narrative.

The Year 11 Studio Arts students have brilliantly launched their artistic journey this year.

They produced wonderfully diverse work, exploring personal ideas, concepts and media. The students are looking forward to the challenges of 2016 and their final year at Saint Ignatius.

Mrs Pennings also worked tirelessly along with **Mr. Peter Martin**, **Mr. Justin Coffey** and selected VCAL students to create the sets for the school musical Hairspray. Anyone who saw the show would agree with me that not only was the production a huge success but that the sets were very complimentary to each of the scenes. Everyone involved did a marvelous job. Well done!

The department is very great full for the generous assistance from the Parents and Friends' Association in 2015. With this gift **Mr. Paul O'Brien**, who teaches Media and Photography at the College, has purchased studio lighting. This enables students to begin learning more about interior lighting for the use in film and still photography.

An A2 state of the art colour printer was also purchased with funds from the PFA for Visual Communication and Design and Senior art students. Already this has been put to good use with VCE students using it to print final works and in preparation for our Mosaic exhibition. Our school is incredibly lucky to have the resources that we do and from all of the staff and students in our department a big thank you to the PFA for their continued support of The Arts.

Ms Tory Wood worked with a group of Year 9 students in Semester One to create a public art piece for our Anzac day service at the school.

Students made poppies from mixed media and installed them on a makeshift wall, which was the background for the service. The sea of poppies was installed by the students during the service and provided a wonderful backdrop in honor of our ANZACs.

Our Indigenous students were invited to install a poppy in traditional indigenous colours and colours representing the Torres Strait Islander people alongside the students who coordinated the project.

The students intention was to recognise all ANZACs and their installation was a very fitting tribute.

Competence Conscience Compassion

Pathways, seems to be the buzzword these days with parents, students, teachers, employers and others when describing career education.

In my role as the WAFE Coordinator, I am provided with the opportunity and challenge to work with students from Year 9 through to Year 12 to begin (and continue) conversations around suitable pathways for these students.

With the wide range of career choice available to young people, these options can tend to complicate and confuse what the young person wishes to undertake - either at school in terms of subject selections or as they leave to undertake further study at University or TAFE.

Some students may choose to leave school to undertake an apprenticeship or traineeship, which can require up to a four-year commitment.

It is my belief a young person must follow their passion as best they possibly can, however it is also important to have a backup plan(s) should the first goal not eventuate. This backup plan should still have a connection with the original passion.

To determine a particular pathway, it is best to try different options whilst still at school - the school environment can cater for a change of plan and can provide some flexibility to assist the students to make informed decisions regarding their future.

Throughout this year, many students in Years 10, 11 and 12 have been given the opportunity to experience life beyond the classroom in the form of either a school endorsed Work Experience Placement, a Structured Work Learning Placement or a School-based Apprenticeship (SbA) position. Overall, these students spent approximately 15,500* hours with various employers around the region in a wide variety of occupations. These opportunities provide students with a taste of a real life work place informing them as to which career path they may need to investigate further.

For others, they discover their original passion is not as they thought as a result of the placement – still however a very worthwhile experience. (* 8000 hours work experience, 6500 hours structured workplace learning and 1000 hours SbA work). I am very grateful and would like to thank all employers who have provided a safe workplace for these students.

Our Year 10 students were given the opportunity to apply for a number of opportunities facilitated by two partnering organisations - The Geelong Regional Vocational Employment Council (GRVEC) and the Geelong Local Learning Employment Network (GLLEN).

These opportunities were created in conjunction with local employers namely; St. John of God Hospital, Ambulance Victoria and through the Alcoa Future Leaders of Industry (AFLOI) program, which incorporated various Engineering and Science-based employers within the region. These experiences proved very worthwhile for the students involved.

Speaking with a Year 10 student participant:

"This great opportunity has given me a plan for my future and I know which subjects I will need to do in Year 11 and 12. They will provide me with a strong foundation for my future studies. I originally wanted to be a Primary School Teacher but now I want to be a Paramedic.

I would strongly encourage those who are in Year 10 in 2016 to look out for these opportunities and submit a good application".

The half-day Year 10 Careers EXPO held on May 27 provided students with the opportunity to meet representatives from The Gordon TAFE, Deakin, La Trobe, Victoria and Australian Catholic Universities.

In addition, our guest speaker **Dr Jude Walker** an Industry Futurist spoke to students about how the advancement of technology will impact future employment opportunities.

Other guests from G- Force and past students provided current students with food for thought.

Students were then encouraged to attend Open Days in August in order to begin searching for suitable future tertiary education options.

A mandatory component of our VCAL program is that all students undertake one Vocational Education and Training (VET) program.

The variety of courses students have undertaken have included: Building and Construction (Carpentry), Engineering (Mechanical), Plumbing, Electrical, Automotive (Light Vehicle), Equine Studies, Hairdressing, Beauty Therapy, Childcare, Community Services, Event Management, Pastry Cooking, Hospitality (Back of House), Allied Health (Massage), Applied Fashion and Animal Studies. As a result, some students have been offered fulltime employment or have decided to undertake further study at TAFE in their chosen area.

Our thanks go to the following local Registered Training Organisations (RTOs); The Gordon TAFE, Diversitat, VFA, Karingal and Pathways Education who have delivered these Nationally Accredited Training Qualifications to our students ensuring they are skilled to industry standards.

In closing, I would like to wish all of our Year 12 students (and also others leaving the College for either work or continuing their secondary studies) the very best as they pursue their passion, be it in employment, University or TAFE. Studies.

The variety of interest amongst our Year 12 cohort is diverse and I consider it a privilege to be able to work closely with them regarding their future plans and goals.

I am sure they will do themselves (and the College) proud and may the lessons learnt at this school remain with them for many years to come as they look back with fondness on their time at Saint Ignatius College.




